WESTMINSTER, March 11, 1831.

**T**HIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by his Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for continuing to His Majesty, for one year, certain duties on personal estates, offices, and pensions in England, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one.

An Act for raising the sum of twelve millions, by Exchequer bills, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one.

An Act to apply the sum of five millions, out of the Consolidated Fund, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one.

An Act for appropriating certain sums to the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one.

An Act for enabling His Majesty to appoint a Postmaster-General for the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

And several English, one Irish, and four private Acts.

An Act to repeal the duties and drawbacks on printed calicoes, linens, and stuffs.

An Act for punishing mutiny and desertion, and for the better payment of the army and their quarters.

An Act for the regulation of His Majesty's Royal marine forces while on shore.

An Act to continue, until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two, an Act of the fifty-fourth year of His Majesty King George the Third, for rendering the payment of Creditors more equal and expeditious in Scotland.

And three English Acts.

ST. JAMES'S-PALACE, March 16, 1831.
