

those rights which secure to My people the privilege of discussing and making known their grievances; but, in respecting these rights, it is also My duty to prevent combinations, under whatever pretext, which, in their form and character, are incompatible with all regular Government, and are equally opposed to the spirit and to the provisions of the law; and I know that I shall not appeal in vain to My faithful subjects to second My determined resolution to repress all illegal proceedings, by which the peace and security of My dominions may be endangered.
