WESTMINSTER, April 3, 1832.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by his Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for granting to His Majesty, until the tenth day of October one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two, certain duties on sugar imported into the United Kingdom, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two.

An Act for more effectually repairing the road leading from Berwick-upon-Tweed, by Ayton-bridge and Ayton, to Dunglas-bridge, and the road from Billie-causeway and Preston-bridge to join the said road at or near Hondwood-house and Bankhouse respectively, in the county of Berwick.

And several English, and three private Acts.
