THE following Address of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland having been transmitted by Robert Montgomery Lord Belhaven, His Majesty's Commissioner, to Viscount Melbourne, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been by him presented to the King; which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

*May it please your Majesty,*

THE gracious letter with which your Majesty has honoured this meeting of the General Assembly of our National Church, has been received by us with deep respect and gratitude.

It yields us the highest satisfaction to be assured of the deep interest which your Majesty feels in the well-being of the Church of Scotland; and of your Majesty's sense of the benefits which have been derived to the interests of religion from the counsels of former General Assemblies. It shall be our earnest endeavour to merit a continuance of the approbation thus graciously expressed.

The re-appointment of a Commissioner, so well qualified as Lord Belhaven, to represent your Majesty's person in our Assembly, we regard as a new proof of royal favour; his faithful discharge of the duties entrusted to him in former Assemblies eminently entitles him to our respect and attachment.

We entreat your Majesty to accept of our most respectful and cordial acknowledgment of the assurance so graciously given of your Majesty's fixed purpose to continue to the Church of Scotland the same support and protection which it has received from your Royal Ancestors; and to maintain it in the full enjoyment of all its rights and privileges

as by law established. Profiting by your Majesty's paternal counsel, we shall in all our proceedings endeavour to the utmost of our power to consult the happiness and best interests of our people; and it is our earnest prayer that our measures may be directed, under the blessing of God, to promote pure religion, peace, and universal charity.

We receive with thankfulness, and shall endeavour to employ with fidelity, the royal donation of two thousand pounds for the propagation of Christian knowledge in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland.

That Almighty God, the Father of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, may bless your Majesty, your Royal Consort, and all the Members of your Royal House; that He may guide your Majesty's counsels and prosper your administration; and that, after a long and happy reign on earth, you may inherit a kingdom which cannot be moved, are the prayers of, may it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most faithful, most obedient, and most loyal subjects, the Ministers and Elders met in this National Assembly of the Church of Scotland.
