The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THIS day the Right Honourable Edward John Littleton was, by His Majesty's command, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took his place at the Board accordingly.

ST. JAMES'S-PALACE, June 12, 1833.

CEREMONIAL of the Investiture of Vice-Admiral Sir John Harvey and Vice-Admiral Sir George Parker, with the *Ensigns of Knights Commanders of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath.*

By command of the Sovereign, Vice-Admiral Sir John Harvey was conducted, with the usual reverences, to His Majesty, preceded by Sir William Woods (the Officer of Arms attendant upon the Knights Commanders), bearing upon a crimson velvet cushion, the star, ribband, and badge of the second class of the Order.

The sword of state being thereupon delivered to His Majesty, the Vice-Admiral, kneeling, was knighted therewith, after which he had the honour to kiss His Majesty's hand. Then the Officer of Arms, on his knee, presenting to the Sovereign the ribband and badge of a Knight Commander, the King was pleased to invest Sir John Harvey with the same.

The Vice-Admiral having again had the honour to kiss the Sovereign's hand, and having received from His Majesty the star of a Knight Commander, retired.

Vice-Admiral Sir George Parker was then introduced, knighted, and invested, with the like ceremonies.

WILLIAM CHRISTIE, Esquire, one of the Cashiers of the Dundee Commercial Bank, Trustee on the sequestrated estate of the said Patrick Taylor, hereby intimates, that a meeting of the said Creditors will be held within the Royal Hotel, Dundee, on Saturday the 6th of July next, at 12 o'clock noon, to consider the state of the sequestration, and adopt such resolutions as may seem to be expedient, and particularly to authorize and direct the Trustee, (should this appear proper), forthwith to wind up the sequestration by a final dividend,—the funds being now realized so far as recoverable; and for that purpose to apply to the Court of Session for authority to accelerate the period for making such division.
