ST. JAMES'S PALACE, June 19, 1833.

This day His Highness the Duke William Alexander, and His Highness the Duke Ernest of Wurtemberg, had their first audience of the King, attended by the Wurtemberg Minister:

To which they were introduced by Lord Viscount Palmerston, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and conducted by Sir Robert Chester, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Queen's-House, St. James's Palace, June 20, 1833.

This day His Highness the Prince de Reuss-Lobenstein, one of the Sovereign Princes of the Germanic Confederation, had his first audience of Her Majesty; and the Chevalier Vial, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from His Catholic Majesty, had his first audience of Her Majesty, and delivered a letter from his Sovereign.
