WESTMINSTER, June 18, 1833.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by his Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to apply the sum of six millions, out of the Consolidated Fund, to the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-three.

An Act for the more effectual administration of justice in the office of a Justice of the Peace in the several police offices established in the Metropolis, and for the more effectual prevention of depredations on the river Thames and its vicinity, for three years.

An Act to indemnify witnesses who may give evidence before either House of Parliament, touching the charge of bribery in the election of burgesses to serve in Parliament for the borough of Stafford.

An Act to enable the Clarence Railway Company to make an extension of the line of their railway.

An Act for draining and preserving certain fen lands and low grounds, in the parish of Wiggenhall St. Mary Magdalen, in the county of Norfolk, and for other purposes.

An Act for more effectually repairing and improving the road from Butterton-moor-end to the turn-pike road leading from Buxton to Ashborne, and other roads therein mentioned, in the counties of Stafford and Derby, and for

making several diversions, or new lines of road, to communicate therewith.

An Act for more effectually repairing the road from Bury St. Edmunds to Newmarket, in the counties of Suffolk and Cambridge.

An Act for improving the Shrewsbury district and the Wellington district of the Watling-street-road, in the county of Salop.

And three private Acts.
