ST. JAMES'S-PALACE, August 8, 1833.

This day Count Mandelsloh, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Wurtemberg, had an audience of His Majesty to deliver a letter from his Sovereign:

To which he was introduced by Lord Viscount Palmerston, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and conducted by Sir Robert Chester, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

At the Court at *St. James's*, August 8, 1833.

**CEREMONIAL** of the Investiture of Lieutenant-General Sir George Anson, Lieutenant-General Sir John Ormsby Vandeleur, and Lieutenant-General Sir Thomas Dallas, with the Ensigns of a Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath.

The following Knights Grand Crosses, in their mantles and collars of the Order, assembled at St. James's-Palace, viz. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland; Lord Howden; the Duke of Wellington; Lord Hill; Sir John Doyle, Bart.; the Honourable Sir Alexander Hope; the Right Honourable Sir James Kempt; Sir Gordon Drummond; Sir George Townsend Walker; Lord Howard of Effingham; the Earl of Rosslyn; the Right Honourable Sir Charles Bagot; Sir George Martin; the Right Honourable Sir Stratford Canning; Sir Thomas Byam Martin;

Sir James Hawkins Whitshed; the Right Honourable Sir John Byng; the Honourable Sir Henry George Grey; Sir James Willoughby Gordon, Bart.; Sir Thomas Masterman Hardy, Bart.; and Lord Viscount Palmerston; attended by Walter Aston Blount, Esq. the Genealogist of the Order; Algernon Greville, Esq. Bath King of Arms; Captain Michael Seymour, Register and Secretary; and Sir William Woods, Clarenceux King of Arms, Deputy Register and Secretary of the Order.

At two o'clock the Knights Grand Crosses were called over, and, with the Officers of the Order, proceeded into the presence of the Sovereign in the Throne-room, with the usual reverences.

Then, by His Majesty's command, Lieutenant-General Sir George Anson was introduced into the Royal Presence, between the two Junior Knights Grand Crosses present, preceded by Bath King of Arms, bearing the ribband, badge, and star of the Order upon a crimson velvet cushion.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland having thereupon received from Bath King of Arms the ribband and badge, presented them to the Sovereign, and Sir George Anson, kneeling, His Majesty was graciously pleased to put the same over the Lieutenant-General's right shoulder; Sir George Anson, rising, had the honour to kiss the Sovereign's hand, and, having received from His Majesty the star of the Order, withdrew.

Lieutenant-General Sir John Ormsby Vandeleur and Lieutenant-General Sir Thomas Dallas were then severally introduced into the presence of the Sovereign, and invested with the ensigns of a Knight Grand Cross of the said Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath, with the like ceremonies.

Upon this occasion Lieutenant-General Sir John Ormsby Vandeleur received the honour of Knighthood, but the other two Lieutenant-Generals were not knighted, having received that honour in the year 1815.
