Extract of a letter from Captain Sir RICHARD STRACHAN, Bart. of his Majesty's ship Diamond, to Mr NEPEAN, dated at Spithead, the 23d instant.

SINCE writing my letter of yesterday's date, we chased on shore, near Cape La Heve, a lugger privateer. The crew had left her, and assembled on the top of the cliffs; and, being joined by numbers, prepar'd to repel any attempt we might make to get her off. I sent the boats, under the orders of Lieutenant Rogers, to destroy her. This service he effected with great judgment; and, notwithstanding a constant fire from the enemy, we had the good fortune to have only one man wounded. We suppose the enemy have lost several.

Copy of a letter from Admiral Lord BRIDPORT, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's fleet employed in the Channel Scudings, to EVAN NEPEAN, Esq. dated the Royal George, at Sea, the 22d of September, 1797.

HEREWITH you will receive the copy of a letter from the Hon. Captain Stopford, of the Phaeton, dated at sea the 6th instant, which I received this morning from Plymouth, acquainting me with his having captured Le Chasseur French schooner privateer, of 6 guns and 47 men, which I transmit for their Lordships information.

MY LORD,

Phaeton, at sea, September 16. 1797.
I HAVE the honour to inform your Lordship, that the squadron under my orders, this day captured a French schooner, Le Chasseur privateer, carrying 6 guns and 47 men; had been out from Bourdeaux fifty days, and made no captures. I have the honour, &c.

ST VINCENT.

His Majesty's ship Aurora, Lisbon, Aug 17. 1797.

MY LORD;

I HAVE to acquaint you of the capture, on the 13th instant, in latitude 39 deg. 41 min. north, longitude 14 deg. 25 min. west, of La Marie Anne, French privateer, of 14 guns and 90 men, commanded by T. J. Dechaille; had been twenty-one days from Nantes without a capture. I have the honour, &c.
