NOTICE is hereby given, that it is the Queen's intention to hold a Drawing-Room on Thursday, March 24th, being for the celebration of Her Majesty's Birth-day.

No presentations can take place on the Birth-day, but it is particularly requested that each Lady and Gentleman attending the Drawing-Room will bring three cards, one to be left in the Waiting-room, one to be delivered to the Lord in Waiting on the King, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain to the Queen, who will announce them to Her Majesty.
