heavy expence which will still be unavoidable, you will, I am persuaded, bear in mind that the present crisis presents every motive to animate you to the most effectual and spirited exertions; the true value of any temporary facrifices which you may find necessary for this purpose; can only be estimated by comparing them with the importance of supporting effectually our public credit, and convincing the enemy, that while we retain an ardent defire for the conclusion of peace on fafe and honourable terms, we possess the means, as well as the determination, to support with vigout this arduous contest, as long as it may be necessary for maintaining the safety, honour, and independence of thefe kingdoms.

" My Lords and Gentlemen,

" After the experience I have had of your loyalty and attachment to me, and of your anxious regard for the interests of my subjects, I have only to recommend to you a perseverance in the

same principles and conduct.
