WHITEHALL, April 24, 1837.

**T**HE King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable Robert Montgomery Lord Belhaven to be His Majesty's High Commissioner to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

WESTMINSTER, April 21, 1837.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by his Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

- An Act to amend several Acts relating to the Royal Mint.
- An Act for punishing mutiny and desertion, and for the better payment of the army and their quarters.
- An Act for the regulation of His Majesty's Royal Marine Forces while on shore.
- An Act to alter, amend, and continue for a certain period, an Act for repealing certain Acts relating to the removal of poor persons born in Scotland and Ireland, and charge-

able to parishes in England, and to make other provisions in lieu thereof.

An Act for making and maintaining certain roads within the county of Aberdeen.

An Act to enable the Duke of Buccleuch and Queensberry to make and maintain a pier at Granton, in the parish of Cramond, and a road therefrom to join the road leading from Leith to Queensferry, in the county of Edinburgh.

And nine English and four private Acts.
