THE remainder of the Lands and Estate of Dryden, situated in the Parishes of Lasswade and Glencorse, and County of Mid-Lothian. COUNTY OF KINCARDINE.
TURNPIKE ROADS.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, in terms of the Standing Orders, that it is intended to apply to Parliament, in the next Session, for leave to bring in a Bill for Repealing an Act passed in the 57th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for more effectually Repairing the Roads from the Bridge of Dee, Southward, through the County of Kincardine, to Stonehaven, and from thence, by Inverbervie and by Laurencekirk, to the Lower and Upper Bridges over the River Northesk, and for Making and Repairing other Roads in the said County;" and for a new Enactment instead thereof, enlarging and continuing the terms of, and powers granted by, the recited Act, and altering and amending some of its provisions, and granting other and farther powers in relation to the same.

And it is intended by the said Bill, to take further powers to the Trustees to be thereby appointed, for altering, improving, maintaining, and repairing the Roads and Bridges within the said County, and more particularly the following Roads, specified and described in the recited Act, and the Bridges thereon respectively, viz. :—

I.—The Road from the Bridge of Dee, Southward, through the County of Kincardine, to the Centre of the Middle Arch of the Bridge over the Water of Carron, at Stonehaven; which Road passes through or into the Parishes of Nigg, Banchoory Devenick, and Fetteresso.

II.—The Remainder or Continuation of the said Road, from the Centre of the Middle Arch of the Bridge over the Water of Carron, at Stonehaven, and the Branches thereof, by Inverbervie, to the Lower Bridge over the River Northesk, passing through or into the Parishes of Fetteresso, Dunnottar, Kinnell, Arbuthnott, Bervie, Benholm, and St. Cyrus: and by Laurencekirk, to the Upper Bridge over the said River, passing through or into the Parishes of Fetteresso, Dunnottar, Kinnell, Arbuthnott, Glenbervie, Fordoun, Laurencekirk, Marykirk, and Fettercairn.

III.—The Road leading from Bervie, extending through the Parishes of Arbuthnott, Fordoun, and Laurencekirk, to the Turnpike Road, at or near the Lands of Redmyre.

IV.—The Road leading from Johnshaven, through the Parishes of Benholm, Garvock, and Laurencekirk, to the Turnpike Road between Stonehaven and Laurencekirk, at or near Polburn.

And also to authorise the said Trustees to make, maintain, repair, and keep in repair, the following New Roads, viz. :—

I.—A Road from the Bridge over the River Northesk at or near the Village of Marykirk, leading through or into the Parishes of Marykirk and Fettercairn, to or near to the Village of Fettercairn.

II.—A Road from or near from the Village of Laurencekirk, to or near to the Village of Marykirk, and passing through or into the Parishes of Laurencekirk and Marykirk.

And it is intended by the said Bill, to change the nomination and qualification, in the recited Act, of Trustees for the said Road, from Bridge of Dee, Southward, through the County of Kincardine, to the Centre of the Middle Arch of the Bridge over the Water of Carron, at Stonehaven, (thereby constituted a District by itself,) by omitting the separate nomination, in the recited Act, of Trustees for the said District, and vesting the Management of the said Road solely in the Trustees appointed by the said recited Act, for the other Roads therein specified and described.

And it is intended by the said Bill, to authorise the said Trustees to declare any of the Roads, for the repair of which the statute labour, or conversion in lieu of statute labour, of any parish, is liable, to be Turnpike Roads, and to vest in the said Trustees the Management of the Roads so declared Turnpike Roads.

And it is also intended by the said Bill, to continue the present Rate of Tolls, but to change and extend the mode of exacting Tolls for Carriages of all descriptions, by imposing such Tolls, not upon the Carriage, but upon each Horse or Beast of Draught drawing any such Carriage proportionally, and according to number, and imposing a separate Rate where three or five, or more than six Horses or Beasts of Draught are Drawing in one Carriage, as well as where any number specified in the recited Act are drawing, and also to impose Tolls upon Carriages drawn or propelled by Machinery.

And it is also intended to empower the said Trustees to levy Tolls and Duties on the said new Lines of Road, and on the Parish Roads authorised to be declared Turnpike, and also to erect Gates, and levy proportional Tolls, in cases where Roads are under six miles in length.

All which Roads, and alterations to be made thereon, are situate within the County of Kincardine.
