

## NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN,

THAT it is intended to apply to Parliament, in the ensuing Session, for leave to bring in a Bill, for the purposes aftermentioned,—viz. To alter, amend, enlarge, and continue, and in part to repeal, the powers and provisions of an Act passed in the 6th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth, entitled ‘ An Act for making and maintaining the Road from Glasgow to Redburn Bridge, and certain other Roads, in the Counties of Stirling, Dumbar-  
ton, and Lanark,’ so far as the said recited Act relates to the Balmore Turnpike Road leading from, or from near to, the Bridge across the River Allander at Langbank Farm, till it join the Turnpike Roads from Glasgow to Inchbelly Bridge and to Strathblane; to improve, widen, straighten, alter, repair, and maintain, that portion of the road above described, which lies between the Bridge, or a point near to the Bridge, across the river Allander at Langbank Farm aforesaid, and the Road leading from Glasgow to Campsie, at, or near to, Torrance Toll Bar; to alter, and to increase, or diminish, the rates, tolls, and duties, by the said recited Act authorised to be levied on the said Road above described, or to repeal the said rates and duties, and impose other Rates and Duties, in lieu thereof. To Make, and Maintain, a new Road from, or from near to, the said Bridge over the River Allander, by, or through, or near to, Langbank, Bardoie Loch, Lands of Jaw, Dowan, Kettlehill, Baldernock Mill, Baldernock Church, and Lands of Bankell, to a point on the Turnpike Road leading from Glasgow to Strathblane, at, or near to, the Road leading to the Farm of Craighash. To make Turnpike, and to Improve, Widen, Straighten, Alter, Repair, and Maintain the Statute Labour Road leading from the Balmore Turnpike Road aforesaid, between Torrance Toll Bar and Redhog, by Hillhead and Borrowston, towards Baldernock Church, to a point near to the Road leading to Blochairn. To Make and Maintain a New Piece or Line of Road, from the said Statute Labour Road, near to the said Road leading to Blochairn, by, or through, or near to, the Lands of Kirkton and Kettlehill, to join the intended New Road above described, at or near to Baldernock Mill.— And another New Piece or Line of Road, from the foresaid Statute Labour Road above described, at, or near to, Borrowston, by or through, or near to, Leechbank, Drumbain, and East and West Balgrochan, to a point on the Turnpike Road leading from Glasgow, by Torrance to Campsie, at or near to Ferrie Mill, or Carlston; and to levy Tolls, Rates, and Duties on the said proposed New Roads, and on the said Statute Labour Road, intended to be made Turnpike as aforesaid; the said Balmore Turnpike Road, and the said Statute Labour Road being situate in, and the said proposed New Roads, being intended to be made, and to pass in, through, and into, the Parishes of Baldernock and Campsie, in the County of Stirling, or one, or other, or both of them; and Plans and Sections of the said Statute Labour Road, and of the said intended new Roads, and Books of Reference thereto, will be deposited in the office of the principal Sheriff Clerk of the County of Stirling, at Stirling, on or before the 30th day of November current; and Duplicates of so much of the said Plans, Sections, and Books of Reference, as relate to each of the said Parishes of Baldernock and Campsie, will be deposited in the hands of the Schoolmasters of the said several Parishes, at their respective residences, on or before the 31st day of December next.

## NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN.

THAT it is intended to apply to Parliament, during the ensuing Session, for leave to bring in a Bill to continue, amend, alter, and enlarge, or so far as necessary to repeal the powers and provisions of an Act passed in the 45th year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Third, entitled ‘ An Act for making and maintaining a road leading from the limits of the Counties of Edinburgh and Lanark to the Burgh of Lanark, in the County of Lanark;’—and another Act passed in the 56th year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Third, entitled ‘ An Act for altering and amending an Act of the 45th year of his present Majesty, for making and maintaining a Road leading from the limits of the Counties of Edinburgh and Lanark into the Burgh of Lanark, with a branch towards Ravenstruther, in the County of Lanark;’ in which Bill it is intended to take farther powers, to the Trustees to be thereby appointed, to make, repair, and maintain the Roads described in the said recited Acts, viz.— The Turnpike Road beginning at the limits of the Counties of Edinburgh and Lanark, near Woodmuir, in the County of Edinburgh, and running westward from the said limits, through the County of Lanark, by or near the Town of Wilsontown, through the Forths to Cleghorn Bridge, and onwards to the Burgh of Lanark, all in the parishes of Carnwath, Carstairs, and Lanark, in the said County of Lanark; and also a Branch or line from the said Road towards Ravenstruther, in the parish of Carstairs and County of Lanark aforesaid, and increase, alter, or modify the tolls, rates, or duties leviable upon the said road.
