Buckingham-Palace, January 24, 1838.

THIS day had audience of Her Majesty:—

Baron Bulow, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Prussia, upon his return to this Court after a leave of absence; Monsieur Tricoupi, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Greece, to deliver his letter of recall; and Monsieur Soutzo, in the same character from the King of Greece, to deliver his credentials:—

To which they were respectively introduced by Lord Viscount Palmerston, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and conducted by Sir Robert Chester, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.
