We, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in Parliament assembled, beg leave humbly to approach your Majesty's Throne, to express our horror and indignation at the late atrocious and treasonable attempt against your Majesty's sacred Person, and our heartfelt congratulation to your Majesty, and to our country, on your Majesty's happy preservation from so great a danger.

We desire to express to your Majesty the deep concern which we feel, at there having been found within your Majesty's dominions a person capable of so flagitious an act; and that we make it our earnest prayer to Almighty God, that He will preserve to us the blessings which we enjoy under your Majesty's just and mild government, and continue to watch over a life so justly dear to us.
