Copy of a Letter from Captain Sir Henry Trollope, of his Majesty's ship *Russell*, to Mr Nepean, dated at Spithead, the 14th of April, 1798.

SIR,

I beg leave to acquaint you, that on the 14th ult. his Majesty's ship *Jafon*, in company with the *Russell*, burnt a small French brig; in ballast, bound from Brest to Nantz; and on the 20th ult. his Majesty's ships *Russell* and *Jafon* captured the *Bon Citoyen*, a French brig privateer, of 12 guns and 65 men, from Granville; had been out fourteen days, and taken nothing—I have the honour to be, &c.
