## TO THE CREDITORS OF

**JOHN FAIRWEATHER** in Easter Barras.—  
At a meeting of the creditors of the said John Fairweather,  
held at Laurencekirk the 7th of May current, for the purpose  
of chusing a trustee upon his sequestrated estate, George Milne,  
writer in Stonehaven, was unanimously chosen trustee; and his  
appointment has been since confirmed by the Court of Session.—  
Upon an application by the trustee to the Sheriff-substitute of  
Kincardineshire, he has appointed Saturday the 2d, and Monday

the 18th of June next, within the tolbooth of Stonehaven, at  
12 o'clock noon, for the public examination of the bankrupt, his  
family, and others connected with his business—And upon 19th  
of June next, at 12 o'clock noon; a meeting of the creditors will  
be held within the said tolbooth, for the purpose of instructing  
the trustee in the management and recovery of the estate. The  
creditors are further required to produce, in the trustee's hands,  
their claims and vouchers or grounds of debt, with their oaths  
on the verity thereof, at or previous to the said meeting; and it  
is hereby intimated, if said productions are not made between  
and the 26th day of February next, being ten months after the  
date of the sequestration, the party neglecting shall have no share  
in the first distribution of the debtor's estate.
