At a meeting of the creditors of the faid John Fairweather, held at Laurencekirk the 7th of May current, for the purpose of chusing a trustee upon his sequestrated estate, George Milne, writer in Stonehaven, was unanimously chosen trustee; and his appointment has been fince confirmed by the Court of Session.—

Upon an application by the trustee to the Sheriff-substitute of Kincardineshire, he has appointed Saturday the 2d, and Monday

The creditors are surther required to produce, in the trustee's hands, their claims and vonchers or grounds of debt, with their oaths on the verity thereof, at or previous to the said meeting; and it \$\frac{9}{15}\$ is hereby intimated, if said productions are not made between and the 26th day of February next, being ten months after the date of the sequestration, the party neglecting shall have no share in the first distribution of the debtor's estate.
