BY THE KING, A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

Whereas George James Earl of Errol was duly elected and returned to be one of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, to fit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of Great Britain, and is fince deceased: In order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to fit in his room, we do, by the advice of our Privy Council, iffue forth this proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to affemble and meet at Holyroodhouse in Edinburgh, on Wednesday the 15th day of August next, between the hours of twelve and two in the afternoon, to nominate and chuse another Peer of Scotland, to sit and vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of Great Britain, in the room of the faid George James Earl of Errol, deceased, by open election and plurality of voices of the Peers that shall then be present, and of the proxies of such as shall be absent (fuch proxies being Peers, and producing a mandate in writing duly figned before witnesses, and both conflituent and proxy being qualified according to law:)
And the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the
Principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his name, are hereby respectively required to attend fuch meeting, and to administer the oaths required by law to be taken there by the faid Peers, and to take their votes; and immediately after fuch election made, and duly examined, to certify the name of the Peer so elected, and sign and attest the same, in the presence of the said Peers the electors; and return fuch certificate into our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And we strictly charge and command that this proclamation be duly published at the market-cross at Edinburgh, and in all the county towns in Scotland, 25 days at least before the time hereby appointed for the meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such election.

Given at our Court at St James's, the 4th day of July, 1798, in the 38th year of our reign.

BY THE KING, A PROCLAMATION,

Respecting Aliens teaving this kingdom and arriving therein.

Whereas by an act passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled, "An act to continue until the 1st day of August 1800, and until the end of the then next session of Parliament, and amend an act made in the 33d year of the reign of his present Majesty, intituled, an act for establishing regulations respecting aliens arriving in this kingdom, or resident therein, in certain cases," divers provisions are made concerning aliens, and it is among other things enacted, that after the passing the said act, it shall not be lawful for any alien to leave this kingdom without a passport for that purpose first obtained from one of our Principal Secretaries of State, or from some person authorized by us to grant such passport, which passport is to be produced to the proper officer of the Customs, at the port or place where such alien shall embark for the purpose of leaving this kingdom, and allowed by such officer, and such passports
