## ADMIRALTY-OFFICE, July 26.

A letter, of which the following is a copy, has been transmitted by Admiral Lord ST VINCENT, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels off Cadiz, to EVAN NEPEAN, Esq; Secretary of the Admiralty.

MY LORD, *Sea Horse, June 27. 1798, off of Pantellaria W. N. W. 12 leagues.*

After a chase of twelve hours, and a close action of eight minutes, his Majesty's ship under my command, this morning at four o'clock, captured the *Sensible*, a French 36 gun frigate, 12 pounders, and 300 men, commanded by Monsieur Bourdé, Capitaine de Vaisseau; was new coppered, copper fastened, and had a thorough repair at Toulon two months ago.

A General of Division, Baraguey D'Hilliers, with his suite, was on board, going to Toulon with an account of the capture of Malta.

The *Sea Horse's* officers and men conducted themselves much to my satisfaction, and I received that assistance from Mr Wilmott, the First Lieutenant, which I might naturally expect from an officer who had been in nine actions, and received eight wounds.

Two masters mates and nine men belonging to the *Culloden*, evinced the same steady courage as the crew of that ship have done on every occasion.

The inclosed is a list of the killed and wounded.
