**EDINBURGH AND BATHGATE RAILWAY.**

(EXTENSION OF WHITBURN BRANCH TO BENHAR COLLIERY, AND DEVIATION OF UPHALL AND BINNIE BRANCH.)

**NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN,**

THAT application is intended to be made to Parliament in the next Session, for an Act to authorise the Edinburgh and Bathgate Railway Company to construct and maintain the extension of the Whitburn Branch of said Edinburgh and Bathgate Railway, from its termination at Whitburn,—and the alteration or deviation of the Uphall and Binnie Quarries Branch of said Railway aftermentioned, with all proper works and conveniences connected therewith, or either of them, or part or parts of either of them,—that is to say, an extension of the Whitburn Branch of said Edinburgh and Bathgate Railway from the point where it terminates at or near the Village of Whitburn, in the parish of Whitburn, and county of Linlithgow, to, at, or near to the Benhar Colliery, at or near the boundary of the parish of Whitburn with the parish of Shotts, and which said extension Railway, with the works and conveniences connected therewith, will be made and maintained in, and pass through the parish of Whitburn, in the said county of Linlithgow; and an alteration or deviation of the Uphall and Binnie Quarries Branch of said Edinburgh and Bathgate Railway, as authorised to be constructed by the Act relating thereto aftermentioned, by mak-

ing and maintaining a new portion of Railway to commence at a point on the main line of said Edinburgh and Bathgate Railway, at or near to the road numbered eleven, parish of Uphall, on the parliamentary plan referred to in the Edinburgh and Bathgate Railway Act 1846, and to terminate at or near Wester Binnie Quarry, in the parish of Linlithgow, such alteration, deviation, or new portion of Railway being to be made and maintained from, in, through, or into the parishes of Uphall and Linlithgow, in the said county of Linlithgow; and it is intended to take power by the said Act to relinquish or abandon so much of the authorised line of the said Uphall and Binnie Quarries Branch Railway as may be superseded or rendered unnecessary by the construction of the said deviation line or new portion of Railway; and it is proposed by the said Act to take powers to deviate from the line of the said intended extension line of Railway, and from the line of the said alteration, deviation, or new portion of Railway to such an extent as will be defined on the plans thereof, to be deposited as aftermentioned.

And it is further proposed by the said intended Act, to obtain power to cross, alter, divert, or stop up, within the several parishes aforesaid, all such highways, and turnpike or other roads, railways, passages, rivers, canals, brooks, streams, or waters, and water-courses, as it may be necessary, and expedient to cross, alter, divert, or stop up, for the purpose of making, maintaining, and using the said intended extension Railway, and said alteration, deviation, or new portion of Railway, and works and conveniences connected therewith: And it is also intended, by the said Act, to take powers for the compulsory purchase of lands and houses, and other heritages, for the purposes aforesaid; and also powers for the levying of tolls, rates, and duties, in respect of the use of the said proposed extension Railway, and of the said alteration, deviation, or new portion of Railway, and works, or conveniences, and to confer exemptions from payment of tolls, rates, and duties: And it is further proposed to vary or extinguish all existing rights and privileges connected with the lands and houses, and other heritages to be purchased, or which would in any manner, impede or interfere with the objects aforesaid, or any of them, and to confer other rights and privileges; and for carrying out the several objects aforesaid, or some of them, or otherwise, it is further proposed by the said intended Act to alter, amend, and enlarge, and to extend the provisions of the Edinburgh and Bathgate Railway Act, 1846, and the Edinburgh and Bathgate Railway amendment and deviation Act, 1847.

GLASGOW, PAISLEY, AND GREENOCK RAILWAY.

Amendment and Branches to the Glasgow, Paisley, Kilmarnock, and Ayr, the Glasgow, Barrhead, and Neilston, and the Glasgow, Strathaven, and Lesmahagow Railways, and to Haugh Pits.

Notice of the intention to present a Petition for leave to re-introduce a Bill to enable the Glasgow, Paisley, and Greenock Railway Company to make certain Branch Railways, and to amend the Acts relating to the said Railway.

WHEREAS, in compliance with the Standing Orders of both Houses of Parliament, there were duly inserted in the month of November last, in the Edinburgh Gazette, and also in newspapers published in the counties of Lanark and Renfrew, Notice of the intention to apply to Parliament in the then ensuing Session, for an Act or Acts to vary, alter, amend, and enlarge, or to repeal the powers and provisions, or some of them, of the several Acts relating to the Glasgow, Paisley, and Greenock Railway, passed respectively in the Sessions held in the first, in the third and fourth, in the fourth, in the sixth and seventh, and in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty; and to empower the Glasgow, Paisley, and Greenock Railway Company to make and maintain *inter alia* a Branch Railway to diverge out of and from the Main Line of the Glasgow, Paisley, and Greenock Railway, at a point or points, at or near to the farm house of Boghead, in the Abbey Parish of Paisley, and County of Renfrew; and to terminate by a Junction with the Main Line of the Glasgow, Paisley, Kilmarnock, and Ayr Railway, at or near to the Candren Burn, in the Abbey Parish aforesaid.

And, Whereas leave was given to introduce a Bill into Parliament for the above purposes; and the said Bill passed the Committee of the Honourable the House of Commons, with various alterations and amendments, and during its progress through such Committee, the whole of the Branches which are mentioned in the original notice for the said Bill, and were sought thereby, except the Branch Railway herein before described, were struck out, and the Report of the Committee on the said Bill was considered in the Honourable the House of Commons, and the said Bill was ordered to be engrossed; but no farther proceedings were had thereon, and the said Bill was suspended as authorised by the Resolutions of both Houses of Parliament, of 10th June 1847.

And Notice is hereby given, that it is intended to present a Petition to the Honourable the House of Commons in the next Session of Parliament, for leave to re-introduce the said Bill so ordered to be engrossed, and to proceed with the same as authorised by the aforesaid Resolutions of both Houses of Parliament.
