This day the Lords being met, a message was fent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that "The Lords authorised by virtue of his Majesty's Commission for declaring his Royal Assent to several acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read;" and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancel-lor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Affent to the faid acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Affent given to

An act for fettling and fecuring a certain annuity on Horatio Nelfon Lord Nelfon, and the two next persons to whom the title of Baron Nelson of the Nile, and of Burnham Thorpe, in the county of Norfolk, shall descend, in consideration of the eminent service performed by the said Horatio Nelson Lord

Nelfon, to his Majesty and the public.
