WESTMINSTER, DECEMBER 17, 1798.

This day the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that "The Lords authorised by virtue of his Majesty's Commission for declaring his Royal Assent to several acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read;" and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act for continuing and granting to his Majesty certain duties upon malt, mum, cyder, and perry, for the service of the year one thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine.

An act for continuing and granting to his Majesty a duty on pensions, offices, and personal estates, in England, Wales, and the Town of Berwick-upon-Tweed, and certain duties on sugar, malt, tobacco, and snuff, for the service of the year one thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine.

An act for settling and securing a certain annuity on Horatio Nelson Lord Nelson, and the two next persons to whom the title of Baron Nelson of the Nile, and of Burnham Thorpe, in the county of Norfolk, shall descend, in consideration of the eminent service performed by the said Horatio Nelson Lord Nelson, to his Majesty and the public.

An act further to continue, until the expiration of six weeks after the commencement of next session of

Parliament, an act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the thirty-sixth and thirty-seventh years of his present Majesty, chapter seventy, videlicet, on the sixth day of June, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven, for the better prevention and punishment of attempts to seduce persons serving in his Majesty's forces by sea or land, from their duty and allegiance to his Majesty, or to incite them to mutiny or disobedience.

FIRST NOTICE—SECOND TERM.

IN the Process of Ranking and Sale at the instance of ADAM SMITH, late of Stock Bridge, and GEORGE NIELSON of St David's street, Edinburgh, with concurrence of his Majesty's Advocate, for his Majesty's interest, against Lieutenant JOHN NEWLANDS of Loch-head, and his creditors; the Lord Meadowbank assigned "the first day of February next to the whole Creditors to produce all their claims, rights, and diligences, competent to them respectively, against the bankrupt or his estate, and whole vouchers thereof, and that of new, for the Second Term; with certification, that what writs shall not be produced shall be held as false and forged, so far as they may affect the bankrupt's estate, and the interests of the Creditors thereon; who have produced, or who shall produce their rights and diligences affecting the same;—and ordains intimation or notice hereof to be made to all parties concerned by inserting this interlocutor, assigning again the Second Term for production, in the newspaper called the Edinburgh Gazette, once every week, for three weeks successively, to the end it may come to the knowledge of all parties concerned.—As also, assigns the said first day of February next to the Creditors, to depone on the verity of their respective debts; and grants commission to the Judge Ordinary, or to any of his Majesty's justices of Peace, within whose bounds the Creditors reside, to take their oaths and depositions, any lawful days betwixt and the said first day of February next, to be reported to the Lord Ordinary that day; with certification, that no Creditor shall be ranked until he shall have made oath on the verity of his debts."
