At the Court at St James's, the 19th December 1798,

PRESENT,

The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.
This day, the Right Honourable Robert Viscount Castlereagh was, by his Majesty's command, sworn of his Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took his place at the Board accordingly.

WESTMINSTER, DEC. 20. 1798.

This day, the Lords being met, and the Commons attending, the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and other Lords named in the Commission, gave their assent to an act to continue, until the expiration of one month after the commencement of the next session of Parliament, an act passed in the last session, for empowering his Majesty for a time, and to an extent to be limited, to accept the services of such parts of his Militia Forces in this kingdom, as may voluntarily offer themselves to be employed in Ireland.

WESTMINSTER, DEC. 22.

This day the Commission above named gave the Royal Assent to

An act for raising the sum of Three Millions, by way of annuities.

An act to enlarge the time limited for the redemption of the land tax, and to explain and amend an act made in the last session of Parliament, intituled, An act for making perpetual, subject to redemption and purchase, in the manner therein stated, the several sums of money now charged in Great Britain as a land tax, for one year from the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-eight.

Copy of a Letter from Admiral Earl St Vincent, K. B. Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels in the Mediterranean, to Evan Nepean, Esq. dated Le Souveraine, Gibraltar, Nov. 23. 1798.

SIR,

I inclose a letter from Lieut. Corryndon Boger of the Majestic, who commands his Majesty's sloop El Corfo, in the absence of Lord William Stuart, her Captain, giving an account of the capture one of the most mischievous of the enemy's privateers which infest the entrance of the Straits; and his activity on the occasion does him great credit.

My Lord,

I have the honour to acquaint your Lordship, that after seeing the convoy into the Bay of Gibraltar, I chased two French privateers, one of which, L'A-dolphe, mounting six carriage guns and 42 men, I captured yesterday evening, the other I drove on shore about two miles to the westward of Tariff; but from the day being far advanced, and very hazy weather, I found it impossible with safety to attempt destroying her.
