At the Levee on Her Majesty's Birth-Day, Gentlemen holding Commissions are expected to appear in Uniform.

In order to provide for the better accommodation of the Noblemen and Gentlemen who may wait upon His Grace, it is found necessary to receive at Dinner upon Invitations only. All Invitations, except for the first day, will be made or followed by Cards, bearing the day.

Invitations for the Dinner on the first day will be given only at the Levee, by the Purse Bearer.

Chapter of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

A Chapter of this Most Noble Order having been summoned for this day, the Knights Companions hereafter named, in their mantles and collars, assembled in the Green Drawing-room, viz.—

The Duke of Wellington, the Marquess of Anglesey, the Marquess of Exeter, the Duke of Buccleuch, the Marquess of Lansdowne, the Duke of Beaufort, the Marquess of Salisbury, the Duke of Cleveland, Earl De Grey, the Marquess of Abercorn, Earl Talbot, the Marquess Camden, the Marquess of Hertford, and the Duke of Bedford, attended by the following Officers, viz —

The Lord Bishop of Winchester, Prelate; the Lord Bishop of Oxford, Chancellor; the Honourable and Reverend George Neville-Grenville, Dean of Windsor, Register; Sir Charles George Young, Knt. Garter Principal King of Arms; and Sir Augustus William James Clifford, Bart. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod.

At half past one o'clock the Knights Companions were called over by Garter, when (Her Majesty and His Royal Highness the Prince Albert having passed into the Throne Room) they proceeded with the Officers of the Order from the Green Drawing-room into the Throne Room.

WESTMINSTER, April 22, 1848.

WAR-OFFICE, May 5, 1848.

The Sovereign being seated in Her chair of state, and His Royal Highness Prince Albert at the table on the right hand of Her Majesty, the other Knights Companions took their respective places at the table; the Prelate standing on the right hand of the Sovereign, the Chancellor on the left hand, the Register, Garter, and Black Rod at the bottom of the table.

The Chancellor then signified to the Chapter Her Majesty's royal will and pleasure that the vacant stall in the Royal Chapel of Saint George, at Windsor, be filled; and, as by the statutes none but a Knight can be elected, the Most Noble Henry Charles Duke of Norfolk was introduced by Garter and Black Rod, and Knighted by Her Majesty with the sword of state; and his Grace, having kissed the Sovereign's hand, retired.

The Knights Companions then proceeded to the election, and the suffrages, having been collected by the Chancellor, were by him presented to the Sovereign, who commanded him to declare, and he accordingly did declare, that the Most Noble Henry Charles Duke of Norfolk had been duly elected a Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

Then, by the Sovereign's command, his Grace was received at the door of the Chapter-room by the Duke of Bedford and the Marchess of Hertford, the two junior Knights Companions present, and conducted between them to Her Majesty, preceded by Garter (bearing the ensigns of the Order upon a crimson velvet cushion), and by Black Rod. The Duke of Norfolk kneeling near the Sovereign, Garter, on his knee, presented the Garter, and Her Majesty, assisted by His Royal Highness Prince Albert and the Duke of Wellington, the two senior Knights Companions present, buckled it on His Grace's left leg, the Chancellor pronouncing the usual admonition.

Garter next presented, in like manner, the ribband and George, and Her Majesty, assisted as before, put the same over his Grace's left shoulder, the Chancellor pronouncing the admonition. The Duke then again kissed Her Majesty's hand, and, having received the congratulations of each of the Knights Companions, retired.

The Chapter being ended, Garter, by Her Majesty's command, again called over the Knights Companions, who, with the Officers of the Order, retired from the presence of the Sovereign, with the usual reverences.

The Queen, as Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, has been graciously pleased, by letters patent under Her royal sign manual, and the great seal of the Order, bearing date this day, to dispense with all the statutes and regulations usually observed in regard to installation, and to grant unto the Most Noble Henry Charles Duke of Norfolk, Knight of the said Most Noble Order, and duly invested with the ensigns thereof, full power and authority to exercise all rights and privileges belonging to a Knight Companion of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, in as full and ample a manner as if his Grace had been formally installed; any decree, rule, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for raising the sum of seventeen millions nine hundred and forty-six thousand five hundred pounds, by Exchequer Bills, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight.

An Act for the better security of the Crown and Government of the United Kingdom.

An Act for punishing mutiny and desertion, and for the better payment of the Army and their quarters.

An Act for the regulation of Her Majesty's Royal Marine Forces while on shore.

An Act for authorising a borough police superannuation fund.

And one English and two Irish Acts.
