The Ladies who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing-Room are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names legibly written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Presence-Chamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

And those Ladies who are to be presented are hereby informed it is absolutely necessary that their names, together with the names of the Ladies who are to present them, should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, on the Tuesday previous to the Drawing-Room, on the 31st of May, before twelve o'clock, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall take place unless the name of the Lady presenting, together with that of the Lady to be presented, shall appear on the card to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, which names shall correspond with those previously sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested, that in every case written cards only be delivered.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas by an Act passed in the seventh year of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the poll at county elections," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the Justices of any county, riding, parts, or division in England and Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing that the number of polling places for such county,

riding, parts, or division is insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the Justices of the Peace for such county, riding, parts, or division, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in an Act passed in the third year of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled "An Act to settle and determine the divisions of counties and the limits of cities and boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of Members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the Justices of the Peace for the county of Montgomery, in quarter sessions assembled, at Newtown, in the said county, on the sixth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places for the said county is insufficient, and praying that the town of Newtown may be a polling place for the said county:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, doth, pursuant to the first-mentioned Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, declare, order, and direct that the said place named in the said petition, namely, the town of Newtown, shall be a polling place for the county of Montgomery; and further, that the Justices of the Peace for the said county, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act of the third year of the reign of King William the Fourth, shall, conformably to that Act, divide the said county into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.
