AT the Court at Balmoral, the 24th day of September 1850,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," and of another Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to explain and amend an Act for making better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-second day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty, in the words following; that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled, 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes;' and of another Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the seventh and eighth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend an Act for making better provision for the spiritual care of populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for altering the bounds of the district of Burley, in the county of York, and diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas it is by the secondly-recited Act enacted, that it shall be lawful, by the authority provided in the first-recited Act, at any time or times within twelve months after the date of the licence of the minister first licensed to any separate district, constituted under the provisions of the same Act, to alter the bounds of such district, although any alteration be not required with a view to the constituting of another separate district; provided always, that the scheme for making any such alteration shall be subject to all the provisions relating to schemes for constituting separate districts under the said first-recited Act; and that any portion of any such separate district which, by any such alteration as aforesaid, shall become detached or excluded therefrom shall, to

all intents and purposes, again belong to and form part of the parish, chapelry, or district out of which such portion was taken, upon such separate district being originally constituted, or to and of any new district, as shall be determined by the like authority:

"And whereas so much of the chapelry of Headingley-cum-Burley, and of the district parish of Saint Stephen Kirkstall, in the said county of York, and diocese of Ripon, as were comprised within the hamlet of Burley, were duly constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, under the provisions of the said first-recited Act, by a scheme prepared by us, and ratified by an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the thirtieth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, and since duly gazetted:

"And whereas the Reverend Thomas Sturgeon, the first minister of the said district, was duly licensed thereto on the twentieth day of October one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine:

"And whereas it has since been represented to us, and appears to us to be expedient, that the bounds of such district should be altered in the manner hereinafter mentioned:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Thomas Bishop of Ripon, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme, that the bounds of the said district of Burley shall be altered so as to exclude therefrom all that part of the said hamlet of Burley which is situate on the north-western side of an imaginary line commencing at a point (marked *a* on the map or plan hereunto annexed) on the northern boundary of such hamlet and at the south-eastern corner of a certain close of land called Green Lane Close, the property of and occupied by Edwin Birchell, the younger, and thence extending towards the south-west along the fence that separates such close from the property of William Beverley as far as the middle of Green-lane, leading from Burley to Headingley, and thence extending towards the south-east along the middle of such last-mentioned lane, and across the turnpike-road leading from Leeds to Kirkstall, to a point (marked *b* as aforesaid) where Dyson-lane enters the said turnpike-road, and thence along the middle of Dyson-lane aforesaid, as far as the Leeds and Bradford turnpike-road, and thence extending towards the north-west

along the middle of such last-mentioned road to a point (marked as aforesaid) where it crosses the boundary of the said hamlet.

"And we further recommend and propose that the portion of the said district which, by reason of the alteration herein-before recommended and proposed, shall become and be detached or excluded therefrom, shall to all intents and purposes again belong to and form part of the said district parish of Saint Stephen Kirkstall.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measure relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the draft of the said scheme has been transmitted to the several incumbents and patrons, as required by the said Acts; and whereas one calendar month has expired since such draft was so transmitted, and certain objections to the said scheme have been laid before Her Majesty in Council, together with the said scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has, notwithstanding such objections, been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Ripon.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth Report of the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the cure of souls in the parish of Sawley, in the county of Derby, and diocese of Lichfield:

Whereas it is by the said Act enacted, with especial view to the better care of populous parishes, that arrangements may from time to time be made by the authority therein provided; that is to say, a scheme duly prepared by us and

ratified by an Order of your Majesty in Council for improving the value or making a better provision for the spiritual duties of ill-endowed parishes or districts, by means of such alterations in the exercise of patronage, as may be agreed upon by patrons, with the consent of the bishop; and where a bishop himself is one of the patrons, with the consent of the archbishop.

"And whereas the united benefice of Risley and Breaston, in the said parish of Sawley, is in the patronage of the Right Honourable George Harry Grey Earl of Stamford and Warrington, and therefore does not fall within the provisions of the several Orders of your Majesty in Council, respecting grants in augmentation of benefices and churches, out of the moneys or estates in our hands, under the said Act, so far as such provisions relate to unconditional grants; and in order to bring it within such provisions the said Earl desires to transfer his right of patronage in such united benefice in manner hereinafter mentioned;

"We therefore recommend and propose, with the consents of the most Reverend John Bird Archbishop of Canterbury, and of the Right Reverend John Bishop of Lichfield, and also of the said George Harry Grey Earl of Stamford and Warrington, in testimony whereof they have respectively signed and sealed this scheme, that the patronage of, and right of nomination to the said united benefice of Risley and Breaston shall become, and be transferred to, and absolutely vested in the said John Bishop of Lichfield and his successors, Bishops of Lichfield, for ever.

"And whereas by reason of the prebend of Sawley having become vacant since the passing of the said Act, the lands and premises described in the schedules marked A and B hereunto annexed, formerly belonging thereto, have become vested in us under the provisions, and for the purposes of such Act:

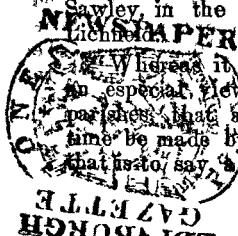
"And whereas the chief of such purposes is that of making better provision for the cure of souls in such manner as may be deemed most expedient:

"And, whereas, after due consideration of the wants and circumstances of the said parish, we deem it expedient that the lands and premises so described as aforesaid should be applied towards making better provision for the cure of souls therein, in manner hereinafter mentioned:

"We therefore further recommend and propose that the piece or parcel of land and premises so particularly described in the said schedule hereunto annexed, marked A as aforesaid, shall, without any conveyance or assurance in the law, other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the gazetting thereof, be transferred to, and become absolutely vested in possession in the Reverend Samuel Hey, perpetual curate of the united benefice of Sawley aforesaid, with Wilne and Long Eaton, and his successors, perpetual curates thereof, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that in like manner and at the same time the pieces or parcels of land and premises so particularly described in the said schedule hereunto annexed, marked B as aforesaid, shall be transferred to, and become, and be absolutely vested in the Reverend Henry Banks Hall, perpetual curate of the united benefice of Risley and Breaston, and his successors, perpetual curates thereof, for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures



relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

“Schedule A.

“All that the church-yard of the parish church of Sawley, in the county of Derby, with the parsonage-house, yard and garden thereunto belonging, and also all that piece or parcel of land, with the out-buildings thereon, heretofore part of the premises called Sawley Hall Farm, and all that meadow, part of a certain close called House Close; all which said premises are adjacent and are bounded on a part of the west and of the north by the town street of Sawley aforesaid, on the east and a further part of the north by lands belonging to the Right Honourable the Earl of Harrington, and on the remainder of the east, on the south, and the remainder of the west, by lands heretofore parcel of the corps of the prebend of Sawley, in the cathedral church of Lichfield, but now the property of the Reverend Spencer Madan; the whole being situate in the township and parish of Sawley aforesaid, and containing together five acres, three roods, and eleven poles, more or less;

“And also all that the site of the ancient tithe barn, yard and premises, situate in the town street of Draycott, in the said parish of Sawley, containing twenty-one poles, more or less:

“And also all that the church-yard of the church of Wilne, in the said county of Derby, together with a cottage, garden, and paddock thereunto adjoining, and now or late in the occupation of John White and William Potter; and also a certain piece or parcel of land, formerly in two closes, called Church Close Pingle and Mead's Close, but now in one close; with the site of a small plantation at the south-west corner thereof, and a piece of land adjoining thereto, heretofore part of Wilne-grounds, bounded on part of the west by the town street of Wilne aforesaid, on parts of the north, of the east, and of the west, by lands lately belonging to — Draper; on a further part of the north by land belonging to the Right Honourable the Earl of Harrington, and on the remainder of the west and on the south by lands heretofore part of Draycott Farm, and parcel of the corps of the said prebend of Sawley aforesaid, but now the property of the Reverend Spencer Madan; all which said church-yard and pieces or parcels of land, bounded as aforesaid, are adjacent, and contain five acres, three roods, and fourteen poles, more or less.”

“Schedule B.

“All those two several closes or parcels of arable land called Ryalls, situate in the township of Breaston, in the parish of Wilne, in the county of Derby, containing by estimation twenty-two acres, and twenty-six perches, or thereabouts, and numbered respectively 185 and 186 on the tithe apportionment map of Wilne aforesaid, and now or late in the occupation of Joseph or John Stevens.

“Also all that narrow piece or parcel of land, with the appurtenances, formerly part of the closes aforesaid, or of one of them, but now situate on the opposite side of the Derby Canal, containing six perches, more or less, and numbered 42 on the said map, and now or late in the tenure or occupation of Benjamin Jowett.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same,

and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

Limits of Port and Legal Quay.

We the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do hereby, under the authority of an Act passed in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled “An Act to amend the laws relating to the customs,” appoint Peterhead, in the county of Aberdeen, to be a Port in that part of the United Kingdom called Scotland, and we do hereby declare the bounds and limits of such port to be as follow; that is to say; that the said Port of Peterhead shall commence at Rattray Head on the north, being the southern extremity of the Port of Banff, and extend southwards to the north bank of Ytham River, being the northern termination of the Port of Aberdeen, and shall extend seaward a distance of three miles from low water mark, along the said coast, within the afore-

said limits, and including all bays, harbours, rivers, and creeks within the aforesaid limits.

And We, the said Lords Commissioners, do hereby appoint the following place within the Port of Peterhead to be a legal quay for the lading and unloading of goods; that is to say: all all that open place, quay, or wharf, situate on the north side of the entrance to the south harbour, called the West Pier, being in length from east to west, one hundred and fifty feet, and from north to south, with the bend opposite the Harbour-street, seven hundred and eighty-seven feet,
