And on Sunday the 10th of November next, the Court to go out of Mourning.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such warrant; and from time to time, by warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof; and from time to time, by warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid; and it is provided, that the power thereby given should extend to any increase, or reduction, or remission of postage.

And whereas the said Commissioners, in exercise of the power for such purpose vested in them by the said Act, have some time since fixed and established rates of postage on letters passing between the United Kingdom and Oldenburgh.

And whereas, in consequence of communications opened with the Post-office of Oldenburgh, it is considered expedient to fix and establish certain rates of postage on printed newspapers, and other printed papers, conveyed between that country and the United Kingdom, and passing through the United Kingdom to or from the British colonies, or foreign countries.

Now we, the undersigned, being two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty Treasury, do, in exercise of the power reserved to us in and by the said Act, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, by this warrant under our hands, order and direct that such printed newspapers, printed publications, printed prices current, printed commercial lists, and printed courses of exchange, as are hereinafter mentioned, may be sent by the post according to the regulations and rates hereinafter set forth; that is to say:—

British newspapers, and such British publications as are allowed to pass by the post as newspapers in the United Kingdom may, if posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Oldenburgh, be sent from the United Kingdom to Oldenburgh direct, or via the territories of Hamburgh, Hanover, | the United Kingdom, by packet-boat or private or Bremen, direct from the United Kingdom to any port in such territories by packet-boat or private ship, free of postage.

Newspapers, and other publications allowed to pass by the post as newspapers in Oldenburgh, published and posted in Oldenburgh, addressed to the United Kingdom, may be sent from Oldenburgh to the United Kingdom direct, or viâ the territories of Hamburgh, Hanover, or Bremen, direct from any port in such territories to the United Kingdom, by packet-boat, free of postage; and by private ship, at the rate of one halfpenny each.

Newspapers, and other publications allowed to pass by the post as newspapers in Oldenburgh, published and posted in Oldenburgh, may be sent from thence to the British colonies and foreign countries, through the United Kingdom; and foreign and colonial newspapers, addressed to Oldenburgh, may be sent from foreign countries and the British colonies to Oldenburgh, through the United Kingdom, (the conveyance, in every case, between the United Kingdom and Oldenburgh being direct, or via the territories of Hamburgh, Hanever, or Bremen, direct between any port in such territories and the United Kingdom, by packet-boat or private ship) at a rate of one halfpenny each.

Periodical works (not of daily publication, and not allowed to pass as newspapers), printed, published, and posted within the United Kingdom, addressed to Oldenburgh, and periodical works (not of daily publication and not allowed to pass as newspapers,) printed, published, and posted in Oldenburgh, addressed to the United Kingdom, may be transmitted between the two countries direct, or viâ the territories of Hamburgh, Hanover, or Bremen, direct between any port in such territories and the United Kingdom, by packet-boat or private ship, at the following rates; namely: For every publication, not exceeding two ounces in weight, one penny.

Above two ounces in weight, and not exceeding three ounces, six pence.

Above three ounces in weight, and not exceeding four ounces, eight pence.

And for every additional ounce in weight above four ounces up to sixteen ounces (the limit of weight beyond which such publications are not to be sent by the post, except at the letter rates of postage,) two pence more; and every lesser weight than an ounce is to be charged as a full ounce.

Printed courses of exchange, printed prices current, printed commercial lists, and such other printed papers as are allowed either in the United Kingdom or Oldenburgh to pass by the post at a reduced rate of postage may, if posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Oldenburgh, or posted in Oldenburgh, addressed to the United Kingdom, be transmitted between the United Kingdom and Oldenburgh direct, or via the territories of Hamburgh, Hanover, or Bremen, direct between any port in such territories and the United Kingdom, by packet-boat or private ship, at a rate of one penny each.

Printed courses of exchange, printed prices current, and printed commercial lists, published current, and printed commercial lists, published and posted in, or addressed to Oldenburgh, may be sent between Oldenburgh and the British colonies or foreign countries through the United Kingdom the conveyance between Oldenburgh and the British Colonies between the United Kingdom bing direct, or via the territories of Hamburgh, Plahover, or Bremen, direct between any part in such territories and

ship, at a rate of one penny each.

The said newspapers, publications, printed courses of exchange, printed prices current, printed commercial lists, and such other printed papers as aforesaid, to be forwarded under and subject to the following conditions; that is to say :-

Each must be printed in the language of the country in which it is published.

Each must be published in the country from which it is sent, and be sent without a cover, or in a band or cover open at the sides, and there must be no word or communication printed on the paper after its publication, or upon the band or cover thereof, nor any writing, figures, or manual marks upon it, or upon the band or cover of it, except the name and address of the person to whom sent.

There must be no paper or thing enclosed in or with any such newspaper, periodical publication, printed course of exchange, printed price current, printed commercial list, or other printed paper.

The courses of exchange, prices current, and commercial lists must contain merely the names and prices of the goods without mentioning the name or residence of the vendor or sender.

Any newspaper, periodical publication, course of exchange, price current, commercial list, or other printed paper not forwarded in conformity with such conditions, is to be chargeable with the full letter rates of postage.

And we direct that every printed supplement. or additional sheet to any newspaper, shall, for the purpose of charging the postage under this Warrant, be deemed a distinct newspaper, unless sent in the same cover, or together with the newspaper to which it is a supplement or addition.

And we direct that in all cases in which any printed newspaper, periodical publication, course of exchange, price current, commercial list, or other printed paper, in respect of which a rate of postage is charged by this Warrant, shall pass through a foreign country, any foreign postage payable thereon shall be charged and paid thereon in addition to the British postage.

And we further direct that the term "Oldenburgh," used in this Warrant, shall be construed to mean the duchy and territories of Oldenburgh (the principality of Birkenfeld, and the possessions of the duchy of Oldenburgh, in Holstein, only excepted), and that the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty.

And we do further direct that this Warrant shall come into full operation on the first day of November 1850.

Provided lastly, and we do hereby declare and direct, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any two of them, by warrant under their hands, at any time hereafter to alter or repeal any of the rates hereby fixed or altered, or the regulations hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time to appoint as what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.

DORWARD'S HOUSE OF REFUGE

DESTITUTE IN MONTROSE.

ALTERING AND MODIFYING POWERS OF TRUST-DISPOSITION AND DEEDS OF CONSTITUTION AND SETTLEMENT.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that it is intended to apply to Parliament in the ensuing Session, for leave to bring in a Bill for explaining and modifying the powers and provisions of the Trust-Disposition and Assignation, or Deed of Constitution for the erection and endowment of a House of Refuge for the Destitute in Montrese, made by William Dorward, Esquire, deceased, Merchant in Montrose, dated the 16th, and recorded in the Books of Council and Session at Edinburgh the 20th days of February 1838; and also of the Trust-Disposition and Settlement made by the said William Dorward, dated the 81st day of January 1839, and Codicils and Letters of various dates relative thereto; which Trust-Disposition and Settlement and Codicils were recorded in the Burgh Court-Books of Montrose on the 14th day of April 1848; and for enlarging, modifying, and declaring the powers of the Trustees or Managers of the said House of Refuge, in the application of the Trust-Funds, and the regulation and management of the said House of Refuge, and matters relating thereto; By which Bill it is intended to authorize the said Trustees or Managers to enlarge the existing Buildings of the said House of Refuge, and to erect or acquire additional Buildings, and to defray the expence, to an extent to be limited, out of the Capital of the said Funds;—to enlarge their powers as to the application of the interest of the Capital to the various purposes of the said House of Refuge;—to authorize them, where necessary or expedient, to invest the said Funds on heritable security, and in the purchase of Feu-duties in Scotland generally ;--to regulate the manner and forms in which Titles and Securities are to be taken, and investments or deposits to be made;—to regulate and simplify the form of assuming Trustees into the private Trust of the said William Dorward, and to alter the qualification of Heritors eligible to be Trustees or Managers;—also, to extend the disciplification applicable to the clicibility of in disqualification applicable to the eligibility of individuals as inmates of the said House of Refuge to individuals admitted into the same, becoming disqualified after admission;—to explain and declare the powers and authority of the Trustees or Managers to educate, within the said House of Refuge, the Children admitted thereto, and to provide the means of such education accordingly: And it is also intended to confer upon Trustees or Managers all necessary powers in regard to the appointment, duties, regulation, and remuneration of Treasurers, Clerks, Medical Attendants, Chaplains, or other officers and servants, and to empower the said Trustees or Managers to make, establish, and enforce all requisite and proper Bye-Laws, Rules, and Regulations for the appointment, conduct, and government of the said House of Refuge, and the inmates, officers, and servants, and all other persons employed in and about the same, and for keeping the accounts of the said funds, and auditing and publishing the same ;to authorize the Trustees or Managers to appoint Committees of their number, with all necessary powers; and generally, otherwise to alter, modify, explain, and declare the powers of the said Trustees or Managers in relation to, and in furtherance of the objects of the said Deeds of the said William Dor-

ward, and for all other purposes necessary or relating thereto: And it is also intended by the and Bill to incorporate the Trustees or Managers, and their successors in office, into one body corporate and politic, with perpetual succession, and a common Seal, with power to hold and transfer property heritable and moveable, and with the other usual rights, powers, and privileges of a Corporate Body; and to confer, vary, or extinguish all rights, powers, and privileges necessary for fully carrying into effect the several purposes of the said Bill.
