CLARENDON.

WHEREAS, under the provisions of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, entitled "An Act for consolidating and amending the Laws relative to Jurors and Juries in Ireland," the Justices assembled at the October Quarter Sessions of the Peace, holden in and for the division of Dundalk, at Ardee, in the said division, on the 18th day of October last, duly fixed a Special Sessions to be holden at the Sessions' House, in the Town of Dundalk, on Monday the 18th day of November instant, within and for the county of Louth, for the purpose of examining the Lists of Jurors returned by the High Constables and Collectors within said county, pursuant to the provisions in said Act contained, and did give public notice of such place and time;

And whereas it has been represented unto Us by the Clerk of the Peace for said county of Louth, that the Lists of Persons returned, pursuant to the provisions of said recited Act, for the said county of Louth, could not be examined or corrected by reason of the non-attendance of John Farley, Collector of Grand Jury Cess for the barony of Lower Dundalk, in said county, at an adjournment of the said Special Sessions, holden at the Sessions' House, in the town of Dundalk aforesaid, on the 22d day of the said month of November instant, whereby said adjourned Sessions could not be effectually holden for the purpose aforesaid:

And whereas, by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, entitled "An Act to amend two Acts of the third and fourth and fourth and fifth years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, for consolidating and amending the Laws relative to Jurors and Juries in Ireland," it is enacted, that in every case in which in any county at large, or any division thereof, or in any county of a city, or county of a town, such Special Sessions shall not be effectually held for the purpose in said Act stated, whether by reason of a sufficient number of Justices not attending, or by reason of a day or place not being fixed for the holding of such Sessions, or by any other cause, it shall and may be lawful, for the Lord Lieutenant, or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland, by Warrant under his or their hand or hands, to fix a day, and also a place in such county or division, or county of a city, or county of a town, for holding a Special Session for the purpose of examining the List of Jurors; as in the said Act of the third and fourth years of the reign of His said late Majesty is directed:

Now We, George William Frederick Earl of Clarendon, Lord Lieutenant-General and General Governor of Ireland, do, by this Our Warrant, in pursuance of the authority so vested in Us, under and by virtue of the provisions of said recited Act of the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, appoint and fix that a Special Sessions, for the purpose of examining the List of Jurors, as in the said Act of the third and fourth years of the reign of His said late Majesty is directed, shall be held at Dundalk, in and for the said county of Louth, on the 12th day of December next, being sixteen days from the publi-

cation of this Our Warrant; of which all persons concerned are to take notice.

NOTICE is Hereby Given, that application is intended to be made to Parliament in the ensuing Session for an Act to Incorporate "The Anchor Assurance Company," and to confer certain powers on the Company, to enable the Company to sue and be sued in the name of the Company or any Officer of the Company; also to enable the Company to grant or effect certain Insurances on or connected with life, and also certain Insurances against loss or damage by fire; to make provision for regulating the granting of such Insurances; also to impose certain duties upon such Insurances, and the instruments by which they may be granted or effected, in lieu of the stamp duties to which Policies and Insurances are now subject to, or liable to pay; also power to enable the Company to effect Sub-insurances, or Insurances with other Companies, and to hold Insurances or Policies of Insurance granted by other Companies; also power to enable the Company to purchase and hold lands, and also to take and hold lands by way of Mortgage or otherwise; and also to confer certain other powers upon the Company and the Directors thereof, for the better enabling them to accomplish the objects and purposes of the Company.
