## A PROCLAMATION.

## CLARENDON.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Sixth and Seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, entitled "An Act to extend the Jurisdiction and regulate the Proceedings of the Civil Bill Courts in Ireland," it was amongst other things enacted, "That it should and might be lawful for the Lord Lieutenant, or other Chief Governor of Ireland for the time being, from time to time, by and with the consent and advice of the Privy Council, to divide the several counties in Ireland, or any of them, or any riding or division of a county, into as many districts as should be thought proper or expedient, for the purpose of more conveniently hearing and determining Causes by Civil Bill, and of transacting all such Criminal or all such other business as might be cognizable or determinable at any General or Quarter Sessions of the Peace, and to appoint one or more convenient town or place, or towns or places in any such district, in which a Civil Bill Court, and a Court for transacting such Criminal or other business as aforesaid, should be held, and every such district should be distinguished by the name of such town or place, and every such Session or adjournment thereof, should be good and effectual for the administration of Criminal business and Civil Bill Cases, and doing all other business that might by Law be done at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace," and it was by said Act further enacted, "That from and after the commencement of the said Act, it should and might be lawful for the Lord Lieutenant, or other Chief Governor of Ireland for the time being, by and with the advice of the Privy Council, to direct that a General Session of the Peace and Civil Bill Court should be held at such times in every year, in all or any of the said districts, and that the persons appointed for holding Sessions, and the Lord Lieutenant or other Chief Governor of

Ireland for the time being, should nominate and appoint the baronies or half baronies, or parishes for which respectively such Sessions should be held."

And whereas by a Proclamation of the Lord Lieutenant and Privy Council of Ireland, bearing date the 24th day of December 1836, made in pursuance of the provisions contained in said recited Act, the county of Antrim was divided into two districts or divisions for the purposes of said Act, and one of said districts, to be called the district of Carrickfergus, was appointed to consist of the baronies of Upper Glenarm, Lower Glenarm, Lower Toom, Lower Antrim, Kilconway, Carey, Upper Dunluce, Lower Dunluce, and the barony of Lower Belfast, excepting the parishes of Carmony, Ballinure, and Ballymoney, and that part of the parish of Templepatrick which is situate in the barony of Lower Belfast, and the towns of Carrickfergus, Ballymena, and Ballymoney were the towns appointed for holding Sessions of the Peace in and for the said district or division of Carrickfergus, and that two General Sessions of the Peace should be held in each and every year in the said town of Ballymena, in and for said district.

And whereas a Memorial hath been laid before Us from certain inhabitants of the said Town of Ballymena, praying that in place of two General Sessions of the Peace, a Court of Quarter Sessions might be holden in future, once in every three months, in said town of Ballymena, for the purposes of said Acts; and it has been also represented unto Us that such additional General Sessions of the Peace for said district would be beneficial, and are necessary.

Now We, the Lord Lieutenant, by and with the advice and consent of Her Majesty's Privy Council of Ireland, in pursuance of the powers vested in Us for that purpose, under and by virtue of said recited Act, do hereby order and direct, that from and after the present Hilary Sessions now holding in and for said county of Antrim, four General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for hearing and determining Causes by Civil Bill, and transacting all such Criminal and all such other business as may be cognizable or determinable at any General or Quarter Sessions of the Peace, shall be holden in each and every year, in the said town of Ballymena, in place of two such Sessions as heretofore have been holden therein for said district; and that the Assistant-Barrister for said county do and shall at the said Hilary Sessions now holding for said county, appoint the times for holding such four General Sessions in the said town of Ballymena; of which all persons concerned are desired to take notice.
