several Proclamations of the Eighteenth and
Thirty-first of July aforesaid.

Now We, the Lord Lieutenant, Do, by this Our
Proclamation, by and with the advice of Her Ma-
jesty's Privy Council in Ireland, declare that from
and after the date hereof, the said several Procla-
mations shall stand and be revoked.

And of this our Proclamation all Justices of the
Peace, of the said Counties, and Counties of Cities

and Towns, Constables, Peace Officers, and all
others whom it may concern, are to take Notice.

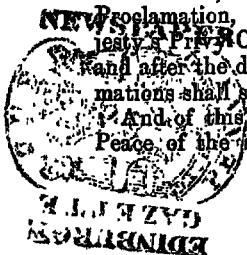
