"the then next Session of Parliament," it was amongst other things enacted, " That whenever, in "the judgment of the Lord Lieutenant or other "Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland, by and " with the advice of the Privy Council of Ireland, it " shall be necessary, for the prevention of crime and " outrage, that the said Act should apply to any "county, county of a city, or county of a town, or "any barony or baronies, half barony or half baronies, " in any county at large, or any district of less ex-" tent than any barony or half barony in Ireland, to "declare by Proclamation, to be published in the "Dublin Gazette, that from and after a day to be "named in such Proclamation, the said Act shall " apply to any county, county of a city, or county of " a town, or any barony or baronies, half barony or "half baronies in any county at large, or any dis-" trict of less extent than any barony or half barony " in Ireland."

And whereas by one other Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to con"tinue, for a time to be limited, an Act of the
"eleventh year of Her present Majesty, for the
"better Prevention of Crime and Outrage in certain
"parts of Ireland," it is enacted, "That the said
"recited Act of the eleventh year of Her present
"Majesty shall be, and continue in full force and
"effect until the thirty-first day of December, in
"the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty"one, and from thence until the end of the then
"next Session of Parliament."

Now We, the Lord Lieutenant do, by this our Proclamation, in pursuance and execution of the said Acts, and by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council in Ireland, declare that from and after Mouday the thirty-first day of this present month of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, the said Acts shall apply to, and be in force in and for that part of the Parish of Garvaghy, which is situate in the Barony of Upper Iveagh, in the County of Down.

And of this our Proclamation all Justices of the Peace of the said County, Constables, Peace Officers, and all others whom it may concern, are to take Notice.
