The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

This day the Right Honourable George Augustus Constantine Henry Phipps (commonly called the Earl of Mulgrave,) and the Right Honourable Laurence Sullivan, were by Her Majesty's command sworn of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took their respective places at the Board accordingly.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas by an Act passed in the tenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, "for the more easy recovery of small debts and demands in England," it is among other things enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that the said Act be put in force in such county or counties as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, from time to time should seem fit, and to divide the whole or part of any such county (including all counties of cities and counties of towns, cities, boroughs, towns, ports, and places, liberties and franchises therein contained or thereunto adjoining), into districts, and to order that the County Court should be holden for the recovery of debts and demands under the said Act, in each of such districts, and from time to time to alter such districts as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, should seem fit, and to order, from time to time, that the number of districts in and for which the Court should be holden, should be increased until the whole of such county should be within the provisions of the said Act, and with the advice aforesaid to alter the place of holding of any such Court, or to order that the holding of any such Court should be discontinued, or to consolidate any two or more of such districts, and from time to time, with the advice aforesaid, to declare by what name and in what towns and places the County Court should be holden in each district :

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by an Order in Council of the ninth day of March one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, to order that the said Act should be put in force in the counties and places therein specified, among which counties the county of Radnor was included, and the town of Presteigne was named as a place for holding one of the Courts of the said county of Radnor for the district in that behalf particularly mentioned in the said Order :

And whereas by certain other Acts made and passed in the thirteenth and in the fourteenth years of the reign of Her Majesty, the provisions of the said recited Act have been amended and extended :

And whereas it hath been represented that it would be of advantage to the public that a County Court should be holden at Knighton, in the county of Radnor, for the parishes and places thereunto adjacent, and which parishes and adjoining places are, by virtue of the said Order, now within the district of the County Court holden at the town of Presteigne.

Her Majesty having taken the premises into consideration, is Her Majesty pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it

is hereby ordered, that from and after the thirtieth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, the parishes and places of Brampton-Bryan, Bedstone, Bucknell, Stowe, Knighton, Heyop, Llanvair-Waterdine, Bettus or Bettws-y-Crwyn, Llanfihangel Beguildy, Llangynllo, Blethvaugh or Bleddfa, Llanfihangel-Rhydithon, Llandewy-Ystradenny, Llanbister, Llananno, Llanbadarn-Fynydd, and townships of Walford, Letton, and Newton, and Adforton, Stanway, Paytoe, and Grange, now in the district of the County Court of Radnorshire, holden at Presteigne, shall cease to be within the district of the said Court holden at Presteigne, and shall form the district of a County Court to be holden at Knighton; and a County Court, for the purposes of the above-mentioned Acts, shall accordingly, from and after such day, be held at Knighton aforesaid, by the name of the County Court of Radnorshire, holden at Knighton, for the parishes of Brampton-Bryan, Bedstone, Bucknell, Stowe, Knighton, Heyop, Llanvair-Waterdine, Bettus or Bettws-y-Crwyn, Llanfihangel Beguildy, Llangynllo, Blethvaugh or Bleddfa, Llanfihangel-Rhydithon, Llandewy-Ystradenny, Llanbister, Llananno, Llanbadarn-Fynydd, and townships of Walford, Letton, and Newton, and Adforton, Stanway, Paytoe, and Grange.

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them that The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to regulate the salaries of the Chief Justice of the Court of Queen's Bench, and the Chief-Justice of the Court of Common Pleas.

An Act to make better provision for the management of the woods, forests, and land revenues of the Crown, and for the direction of public works and buildings.

An Act to amend the Public Health Act, and an Act of the third and fourth years of King William the Fourth, in respect of the assessment of tithe, and tithe rent charges for certain rates.

An Act to facilitate the more speedy arrest of absconding debtors.

An Act to amend the law relating to the expenses of prosecutions, and to make further provision for the apprehension and trial of offenders in certain cases.

An Act for disafforesting the forest of Hainault, in the county of Essex.

An Act for better paving, lighting, cleansing, regulating, and improving the parish of Saint Mary Abbots, Kensington.
