BUCKINGHAM-PALACE, August 8, 1851.

THIS day Her Majesty, accompanied by His Royal Highness Prince Albert, proceeded in state from Buckingham-Palace to the House of Peers, where she arrived soon after two o'clock; and was received on alighting from her state coach, by the Lord Chancellor, the Lord President of the Council, the Lord Privy Seal, Sir Augustus Clifford, Bart. C.B. Deputy Great Chamberlain, (in the absence of the Lord Willoughby d'Eresby,) the Lord Steward of the Household, the Duke of Wellington, Garter King of Arms, and the Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, and proceeded to the robing-room in the customary manner.

Her Majesty was there robed, and the procession moved into the House in the usual order;—the sword of state was borne by the Duke of Wellington, the cap of maintenance by the Marquess of Winchester, and the crown by the Marquess of Lansdowne.

Her Majesty being seated on the Throne, and His Royal Highness Prince Albert on a Chair on the left side of the Cloth of Estate, the Great Officers of State and others standing on the right and left, James Pulman, Esquire, Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a message from Her Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, Her Majesty was pleased to give the Royal assent to

An Act to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Fund, and certain other sums, to the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, and to appropriate the supplies granted in this Session of Parliament.

An Act to amend the Acts relating to the Merchant Seamen's Fund, and to provide for winding up the said fund, and for the better management thereof in the mention

agement thereof in the meantime.

An Act to facilitate the management and improvement of episcopal and capitular estates in England.

England.

An Act for appointing Commissioners to inquire into the existence of bribery in the borough of St. Albans.

An Act to continue an Act of the fourteenth year of Her Majesty for charging the maintenance of certain poor persons in Unions in England and Wales upon the common fund, and to make certain amendments in the laws for the relief of the poor.

An Act to confirm certain provisional orders of the General Board of Health.

An Act to amend the Acts relating to the veud and delivery of coals in London and Westminster, and in certain parts of the adjacent counties, and to allow a drawback on coals conveyed beyond certain limits.

And one private Act.

After which Her Majesty was pleased to deliver the following most gracious Speech to both Houses of Parliament:—

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I am glad to be able to release you from your attendance in Parliament, and I thank you for the diligence with which you have performed your laborious duties.

I continue to maintain the most friendly relations

with Foreign Powers.

I am happy to be able to congratulate you on the very considerable diminution which has taken place in the African and Brazilian Slave Trade. The exertions of My squadrons on the coasts of Africa and Brazil, assisted by the vigilance of the cruisers of France and of the United States, and aided by the co-operation of the Brazilian Government, have mainly contributed to this result.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I thank you for the readiness with which you have granted the supplies necessary for the service of the year.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

It is satisfactory to observe that, notwithstanding very large reductions of taxes, the Revenue for the past year considerably exceeded the public expenditure for the same period.

ture for the same period.

I am rejoiced to find that you have thereby been enabled to relieve My people from an impost which restricted the enjoyments of light and air in their dwellings. I trust that this enactment, with others to which your attention has been and will be directed, will contribute to the health and comfort of My subjects.

I thank you for the assiduity with which you have applied yourselves to the consideration of a measure framed for the purpose of checking the undue assumption of Ecclesiastical Titles conferred by a Foreign Power.

It gives Me the highest satisfaction to find that while repelling unfounded claims, you

have maintained inviolate the great principles of religious liberty so happily established amongst us.

The attention you have bestowed on the administration of justice in the Courts of Law and Equity, will I trust prove beneficial, and lead to further

improvements.

I have willingly given My consent to a bill relating to the Administration of the Land Revenues of the Crown, which will I hope conduce to the better management of that department, and at the same time tend to the promotion of works of public utility.

It has been very gratifying to Me, on an occasion which has brought many Foreigners to this Country, to observe the spirit of kindness and goodwill

which so generally prevailed.

It is My anxious desire to promote among Nations the cultivation of all those Arts which are fostered by peace, and which in their turn contri-

bute to maintain the peace of the World.

In closing the present Session, it is with feelings of gratitude to Almighty God that I acknowledge the general spirit of loyalty and willing obedience to the law which animates My people. Such a spirit is the best security at once for the progress and the stability of our free and happy Institutions.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by Her Majesty's command, said

This day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them that The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to provide for the better distribution, support, and management of medical charities in Ireland; and to amend an Act of the eleventh year of Her Majesty, to provide for the execution

of the laws for the relief of the poor in Ireland.

An Act to continue certain temporary provisions relating to the collection of grand jury cess in Ireland; and also to provide for the due annexation of an isolated district, formerly of the county of Dublin, to a barony of the county of Wicklow, for the purposes of grand jury cess, and other purposes.

An Act to regulate certain proceedings in relation to the elections of representative peers for

Scotland.

An Act to repeal so much of an Act of the twelfth year of King George the Third, relating to the making, keeping, and carriage of gunpowder, as exempts therefrom certain guupowder magazines and stores near Liverocol, and to make certain temporary provisions with regard to the said magazines and stores.

An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the erection and endowment of churches and chapels and perpetual curacies in Ireland.

An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to ecclesiastical residences in Ireland.

An Act to alter certain duties of Customs, and to enable the Treasury to regulate the mode of keeping the account between the Receiver-General of Customs and the Bank of England.

An Act to repeal the Act for constituting Com-

missioners of Railways.

An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the regulation of steam navigation, and to the boats and lights to be carried by sea-going

An Act for the settlement of the boundaries between the provinces of Canada and New Bruns-

An Act to improve the administration of justice in the Court of Chancery, and in the Judicial Com mittee of the Privy Council.

An Act to amend and continue the Metropolitan Sewers Act.

An Act for transferring the duties of paving, lighting, watering, and cleansing parts of the Crown Estate, in the district of the Regent's-park, and certain streets and places in Westminster, from the Commissioners acting under several Acts of their late Majesties King George the Fourth and King William the Fourth, to the parishes; and for transferring the jurisdiction of the said Commissioners over certain other places in West-minster to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Works and Public Buildings; and for other purposes.

An Act to authorize the removal from India of insane persons charged with offences, and to give

better effect to inquisitions of lunacy taken in India.

An Act to simplify the forms of appointments to certain offices, and the manner of passing grants under the Great Seal.

An Act for the better collection of fines, penalties, issues, amerciaments, and forfeited recognizances in Ireland.

An Act to amend the Church Building Acts. An Act to amend the Farmers' Estate Society (Ireland) Act, 1848.

An Act to consolidate and amend the Acts relating to certain offences and other matters as to which Justices of the Peace exercise summary jurisdiction in Ireland.

An Act to consolidate and amend the Acts regulating the proceedings at Petty Sessions, and the duties of Justices of the Peace out of Quarter Sessions in Ireland.

An Act to alter and amend certain provisions of the Lands' Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, so for as relates to Ireland.

An Act to authorize the Shrewsbury and Chester Railway Company to abandon the Crickheath and Wem branches; to construct a station at Birkenhead; to enter into arrangements with other Companies; and for other purposes.

An Act for amending and extending the provisions of the Act for the improvement of the town of Saint Helens, in the county palatine of Lan-

caster, and for other purposes.

An Act for repairing the road from Sheffield, in the county of York, to the Marple Bridge Road, in the parish of Glossop, in the county of Derby, and the branch to Mortimer's Road, in the parish of Hathersage, in the said county of Derby.

An Act to sanction certain arrangements entered into between the Caledonian Railway Company and the holders of guaranteed and preferential interests in the Company, and to enable the Company to raise a further sum of money.

An Act for incorporating the Council of King's College, London, and the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Governors of King's College Hospital, and for connecting the said hospital as a medical school with the said college; and for better enabling the corporation to carry on their charitable and useful designs.

An Act to dissolve the National Land Company, and to dispose of the lands and property belonging to the Company, and to wind up the undertaking.

An Act to extend the limits of the Brunswick Square (Hove) Improvement Act, and for other purposes.

An Act to amend the several Acts relating to the Waterford and Kilkenny Railway Company; to enable the said Company to sell or lease their undertaking, and to purchase or lease the bridge over the River Suir at Waterford, and for other purposes.

An Act for incorporating the European and American Electric Printing Telegraph Company, and to enable them to work certain letters-patent.

An Act for enabling the United Kingdom Electric Telegraph Company to purchase and work certain letters-patent.

An Act to enable the Trustees of the South Holland Drainage, in the county of Lincoln, to raise further monies.

An Act for reclaiming from the sea certain lands abutting on the coast of Lincolnshire, within the parts of Holland.

An Act to enable the Charing Cross Bridge Company to raise further monies; to amend the Acts relating to the Company, and for other purposes.

An Act to amend the law of evidence. An Act for enabling the Class A shareholders of the Saint Andrew's and Quebec Railroad Company to divide the shares in the undertaking into two classes, and for other purposes.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, or in respect of letters, newspapers, parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmis-

sion of such letters and papers by the post:

And whereas by an Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-office," the proviso concerning the maximum weight of letters to be sent by the post as fixed in and by the said first mentioned Act is repealed; and in order to prevent packets of an unwieldy bulk or an inconvenient size being transmitted by the post, power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, at any time or times thereafter, by Warrant under their hands, to fix a maximum weight of letters to be sent by the post, and from time to time to repeal or revoke such maximum weight wholly or in part, and declare any other maximum of weight in lieu thereof, and all letters are to be forwarded, conveyed, and delivered by the post in conformity with any such Warrant, and also in conformity with, and under and subject to all such orders, conditions, limitations, regulations, and restrictions as to the form, size, or dimensions thereof, whether in proportion to the weight or otherwise, as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, shall from time to time direct; and by the said Act power is also given to the Post-master-General to collect and receive the foreign and colonial postage charged or chargeable on any letters sent by the post, and also, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to require the postage, British, Colonial, or Foreign of any letters sent by the post, to be prepaid either in money or in stamps, as he may think fit, on the same being put into the Post-Office, and also with such consent to abolish or restrict the prepayment in money of postage on letters sent by the post, either altogether or on certain letters, and to require the prepayment thereof to be in stamps, and to refuse to receive or send by the post any letters tendered contrary to any regulations thereby made; and it is also declared and enacted that it shall be lawful for the Postmaster-General, and any officer of the Post-Office, to detain any letters which shall be posted or sent by the post contrary to the regulations of that Act, or the first-mentioned Act, or contrary to the regulations of any Treasury Warrant to be issued under or by virtue of that Act, or which had been or should be issued under or by virtue of the said first-mentioned Act, and to open such letters, and either to return them to the senders thereof, or to forward them to the places of their destination, charged in either case with such rates of postage as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, shall from time to time direct.

Now we, the undersigned, being two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said before-mentioned Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, by this Warrant under our hands, order and direct reviews, printed pamphlets, (whether British, colonial, or foreign,) may from henceforth be transmitted by the post, between any part of the United Kingdom and the Province of Nova Scotia, subject to the several regulations and rates hereinafter contained, (that is to say,)

On every packet consisting of a single printed book, or printed magazine, or printed review, or printed pamphlet, the several sheets, or parts of which when more than one, shall be sewed or bound together, if not exceeding half-a-pound in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of sixpence.

And on every such packet, if exceeding half-apound, and not exceeding one pound in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of one shilling.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound, and not exceeding two pounds in weight, there shall be charged and take one uniform rate of postage of two shillings.

And on every such packet, if exceeding two pounds, and not exceeding three pounds in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of three shillings.

And for every additional one pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of three pounds, there shall be charged and taken an additional rate of postage of one shilling, and every fraction of such additional pound shall be charged as an additional pound.

And we further order and direct that no such packet, if containing more than one printed book, or printed magazine, or printed review, or printed pamphlet, or containing any paper or thing besides a printed book, printed magazine, printed review, or printed pamphlet, or containing any printed book, printed magazine, printed review, or printed pamphlet, the several sheets, or parts of which when more than one, shall not be sewed or bound together, or which packet in length or breadth, or width, or depth, shall exceed the dimensions of two feet, or twenty-four inches, shall be forwarded by the post under the provisions

And we further order and direct that as to any packet hereinbefore authorized to be sent by the post under the provisions aforesaid, which shall be post under the provisions aforesaid, which shall be posted in the United Kingdom, the postage thereof shall in every case be prepaid at the time of the same being posted, not in money, but by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed, or appear on the outside of every such packet, near the address, and shall be of the value or amount of the restage and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon, under or by virtue of this Warrant; and as to any such packet posted in Nova Scotia, the postage thereof shall in every case be prepaid, either in money or by the proper postage stamp or stamps being affixed thereto, at the time of the same being posted.

And we further order and direct that every such packet shall be sent without a cover, or in a cover or envelope open at the end or sides, and shall contain printed matter only, with the binding thereof, and there shall be no writing or marks upon the cover or envelope thereof, or upon or within any part of the contents thereof, other than the name and address of the person to whom the packet shall be sent.

And in order to prevent any obstacles to the due and regular transmission of letters by the post, we further direct that it shall be lawful for any that printed books, printed magazines, printed officer of the Post-office in the United Kingdom to

delay the transmission of any packet posted or forwarded by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, either for the space of twenty-four hours from the time at which (or at his option until the dispatch of the mail next after that by which) the same ought otherwise to have been forwarded by him.

And we further direct that nothing hereinbefore contained shall be construed to interfere with or affect the transmission by the post of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament, or of printed votes and proceedings of the Colonial Legislatures, nor of printed papers or other printed publications which are allowed to pass by the post

under the newspaper privilege

And we further order and direct that if any packet sent, or tendered, or delivered in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this present Warrant, shall contain any paper or thing besides a printed book, printed magazine, printed review, or printed pamphlet, and the binding thereof, or shall have any writing or marks upon the same, or upon the cover or envelope thereof, except the name and address of the person to whom it is forwarded, or shall not be open at the ends or sides, or shall in length, or breadth, or width, or depth, exceed the dimensions of two feet or twenty-four inches, or shall contain more than one printed book, or printed magazine, or printed review, or printed pamphlet, or shall contain any printed book, printed magazine, printed review, or printed pamphlet, the several sheets, or parts of which when more than one, shall not be sewed or bound together, or if the postage of any such packet posted in the United Kingdom shall not be duly and properly prepaid by stamps when posted, or if the postage of any such packet posted in Nova Scotia shall not be duly and properly prepaid in money or by stamps when posted, the same shall and may be detained and opened at any place in the United Kingdom, and at the option of the Postmaster-General shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination; and any such packet on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall be chargeable with the like amount of postage to which it would have been liable as a lefter.

And we further direct that nothing herein coutained shall be construed to extend to any packets sent through France, or any other foreign country, to which a transit rate of postage would be payable thereon, nor to any packets sent by private

And we further order and direct that the term "by the post," used in this Warrant, shall, as to the sea conveyance, include the conveyance by packet-boat; and that the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty

Provided lastly, and we do hereby declare and direct that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any two of them, by Warrant under their hands, at any time hereafter to alter or repeal any of the rates hereby fixed or altered, or the regulations hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time to appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.
