West Derby Union.—Kirkdale Township.

To the Overseers of the Poor of the township of Kirkdale, in the county of Lancaster ;

To the Clerk or Clerks to the Justices of the Petty Sessions held for the division or divisions in which the said township is situate ;

And to all Others whom it may concern.

Whereas the population of the township of Kirkdale, in the county of Lancaster, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons :

And whereas at a meeting of the Vestry of the said township, held, after public notice in that behalf, on Thursday the fifteenth day of May last, it was Resolved,—

“That the Poor Law Board be requested to issue an Order under their seal of office, directing that the Act passed on the fifth of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, (13th and 14th Vict., c. 57, intituled “An Act to prevent the holding of vestry or other meetings in churches, and for regulating the appointment of vestry clerks,”) shall be applied to, and put in force within, this township as regards the appointment of a vestry clerk.”

And whereas there being no Churchwardens of the said township, the Overseers thereof have made their application in writing to the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the above Resolution.

Now therefore We, the said Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, do hereby order and direct that so much of the said Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, as relates to the appointment of a vestry clerk, shall forthwith be applied to, and be put in force within the said township of Kirkdale.

And, at the request of the said Overseers, We do hereby prescribe and direct that, in addition to

the duties of the vestry clerk set forth in the said Act, it shall be the duty of such vestry clerk, when required by the said Overseers,—

To attend Appeals made to the Quarter Sessions against the assessment of any properties to the poor rate of the said township, and to make all necessary entries in the poor rate book relating to the decisions of the said Court respecting such appeals :

To investigate cases of paupers' settlement which concern the said township, and in such cases to procure all the evidence required by the said township, that may be within his power to obtain :

To take all necessary proceedings to procure orders from the Justices for the removal from the said township of paupers that have no settlement therein, or are otherwise removable therefrom :

To assist the Overseers in valuing any property liable to be assessed to the poor rate of the said township.

And we do hereby direct as follows, that is to say :

Firstly. That every person appointed to the office of vestry clerk in the said township, shall give to the Overseers of the Poor of the said township, a bond, in the penal sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, in the names of himself and two sufficient sureties, conditioned for the due and faithful performance of the duties of the office ; and every such officer shall give immediate notice to the Overseers for the time being of the death, insolvency, or bankruptcy of either of such sureties, and shall, when required by such Overseers, produce a certificate, signed by two householders, that his sureties are alive and believed by them to be solvent, and shall supply a fresh surety in the place of any such surety who may die or become bankrupt or insolvent.

Provided that the Overseers may, if they think fit, take the security of any society or company expressly authorized by Statute to guarantee or secure the faithful discharge of the duties of any poor law officer.

Secondly. That the Auditor of the district comprising the West Derby Union, wherein the said township is situated, shall, in the statement required by the General Order of the Poor Law Commissioners, dated the seventeenth day of March one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, to be transmitted to the Poor Law Board, of the securities of the officers of the said Union, include the name of the vestry clerk for the time being, appointed under the authority hereof, together with the particulars in the said General Order required, and shall report thereon to the Board of Guardians of the said Union, in like manner as therein set forth with reference to the securities of other officers.

Thirdly. That a copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette.
