CHAPTER of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

A CHAPTER of the Most Noble Order of the Garter having been summoned for this day, the Knights Companions hereafter named, in their mantles and collars, assembled in St. George's Hall, viz.—

The Duke of Wellington, the Marquess of Anglesey, the Marquess of Lansdowne, the Marquess of Salisbury, the Duke of Cleveland, the Marquess Camden, the Marquess of Hertford, the Duke of Bedford, and the Duke of Norfolk, attended by the following officers, viz.—the Lord Bishop of Winchester, Prelate; the Lord Bishop of Oxford, Chancellor; Sir Charles George Young, *Knt.* Garter, Principal King of Arms; and Sir Augustus William James Clifford, *Bart.*, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod.

At one o'clock the Knights Companions were called over by Garter, when (Her Majesty and His Royal Highness Prince Albert having passed into the Throne-room) they proceeded, together with the Officers of the Order, through the Grand Reception-room into the Throne-room.

The Sovereign being seated in Her Chair of State, and His Royal Highness the Prince Albert at the table, on the right hand of Her Majesty, the other Knights Companions took their respective places at the table, the Prelate standing on the right hand and the Chancellor on the left hand of the Sovereign, Garter and Black Rod at the bottom of the table.

The Chancellor then signified to the Chapter Her Majesty's Royal will and pleasure that the vacant stall in the Royal Chapel of St. George, at Windsor, be filled, and as by the Statutes a Knight only can be elected, the Right Honourable Charles William Earl Fitzwilliam was introduced by Garter and Black Rod and knighted with the Sword of State, and his lordship having kissed the Sovereign's hand, retired.

The Knights Companions then proceeded to the election, and the suffrages having been collected by the Chancellor, were by him presented to the Sovereign, who commanded him to declare, and he accordingly did declare, that the Right Honourable Charles William Earl Fitzwilliam had been

duly elected a Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

Then, by the Sovereign's command, his Lordship was received at the door of the Chapter-room by the Dukes of Norfolk and Bedford, the two Junior Knights Companions present, and conducted between them to Her Majesty, preceded by Garter (bearing the ensigns of the Order upon a crimson velvet cushion), and by Black Rod, Earl Fitzwilliam kneeling near the Sovereign, Garter on his knee presented the Garter, and Her Majesty, assisted by His Royal Highness Prince Albert and the Duke of Wellington, the two Senior Knights Companions present, buckled it on his Lordship's left leg, the Chancellor pronouncing the usual admonition.

Garter next presented, in like manner, the Ribband and George, and Her Majesty, assisted as before, put the same over his Lordship's left shoulder, the Chancellor pronouncing the admonition. Earl Fitzwilliam then again kissed Her Majesty's hand, and, having received the congratulations of each of the Knights Companions, retired.

The Chapter being ended, Garter, by Her Majesty's command, again called over the Knights Companions, who, with the Officers of the Order, retired from the presence of the Sovereign, with the usual reverences.

The Queen, as Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, has been graciously pleased, by letters-patent under Her royal sign manual and the great seal of the Order, bearing date this day, to dispense with all the Statutes and Regulations usually observed in regard to installation, and to grant unto the Right Honourable Charles William Earl Fitzwilliam, Knight of the said Most Noble Order, and duly invested with the Ensigns thereof, full power and authority to exercise all rights and privileges belonging to a Knight Companion of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, in as full and ample a manner as if his Lordship had been formally installed, any decree, rule, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

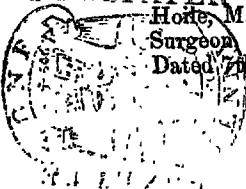

DEESIDE RAILWAY.

ALTERATION OF LINE AND LEVELS—ABANDONMENT OF PARTS THEREOF—CONSTRUCTION OF STATION APPROACHES, WITH A BRIDGE OVER THE DEE—EXTENSION OF TIME FOR COMPULSORY PURCHASE OF LANDS, AND FOR CONSTRUCTION OF WORKS—ALTERATION AND DECREASE OF CAPITAL—ALTERATION IN THE AMOUNT AND NUMBER OF SHARES—ALTERATION OF TOLLS—REPEAL AND AMENDMENT OF ACT—AND OTHER PURPOSES.

NOTICE is Hereby Given, that Application is intended to be made to Parliament, in the ensuing Session, for leave to bring in a Bill to alter, amend, extend, and enlarge, and to repeal some of the powers and provisions of "The Deeside Railway Act, 1846," or wholly to repeal the said Act, and to make other provisions in lieu thereof, and to confer upon the Deeside Railway Company further and additional powers in respect of the undertaking authorized by the said Act as proposed to be varied or altered under the said Bill.

AND NOTICE IS ALSO HEREBY GIVEN, that it is intended by the said Bill to enable the said Company to divert and alter the authorized line and levels of part of the said Railway, and to make another Railway, or portion of Railway, in lieu thereof, and to construct additional Works in connection with the new line or lines of Railway, and also, with the unaltered portions of the said authorized line of Railway; which said diversion and alteration of the said authorized line of Railway, and the proposed alteration of the levels thereof, and the portion of new Railway to be made in lieu of the authorized portions of Railway to be abandoned, will commence at or near the place or point of Junction of the authorized line of the Deeside Railway with the line of the Aberdeen Railway, in the Parish of Old Machar, in the County of Aberdeen, near the existing Station thereof, and as shown on the deposited plans of the said authorized line of Railway, mentioned and referred to in the said Act; and pass, and will be made from, through, or into the several Parishes of Old Machar, Banchory-Devenick, Peterculter, and Drumoak, in the County of Aberdeen, and Banchory-Ternan, in the County of Kincardine, or some or one of them, and will terminate at or near the Free Church at Banchory, and where the road, numbered 179 on the deposited plans of the said authorized line of Railway in the said Parish of Banchory-Ternan, crosses the authorized line of the said Railway, in the said Parish.

AND NOTICE IS ALSO HEREBY GIVEN, that it is intended by the said Bill to authorize the said Company to abandon and relinquish the construction of the portion of the said authorized line of Railway, between the points herein-before mentioned, which will be rendered unnecessary by the formation of the said new line of Railway, between the same points; which said proposed new line of Railway through the said Parishes of Old Machar, Banchory-Devenick, Peterculter, Drumoak, and Banchory-Ternan, except only about three furlongs thereof, in the said Parish of Banchory-Ternan, is subject to the powers of deviation to be contained in the said Bill, intended to be made within the limits of deviation from the authorized line of the said Railway, as delineated on the said deposited plans thereof referred to in the said Act.

AND NOTICE IS ALSO HEREBY GIVEN, that it is intended by the said Bill to authorize the said Company to abandon and relinquish the construction of so much of their said Railway, authorized by the said Act, as lies, or is authorized to be made between the road numbered 179 on the deposited Plans of said Railway, in the Parish of Banchory-

Ternan, in the county of Kincardine, and the authorized termination of the said Railway, at or near Aboyne, in the County of Aberdeen.

AND NOTICE IS ALSO HEREBY GIVEN, that, for the purpose of giving access to and from an intended Station, to be constructed on the said Railway, at or near Redford, in the Parish of Drumoak, and County of Aberdeen, it is intended to insert in the said Bill powers to construct approaches or roads to the said Station from the Turnpike Road from Aberdeen to Banchory, commonly called the North Deeside Road, and also, from the Turnpike Road leading from Aberdeen to Banchory-Ternan, commonly called the South Deeside Road; the first of which said approaches or roads will commence out of and on the south side of the said North Deeside Road, at or near the point marked A in the field numbered 93 in the said Parish of Drumoak on the Plans to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned, and passing from and through the said field, and terminating at the said proposed Station which is intended to be made on or adjoining the said field, all in the said Parish of Drumoak, and the other of the said approaches or roads will commence at or near the point B in the Plans to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned, and near to the approach to Durris House, on the north side of, and out of the said South Deeside Road, in the Parish of Durris, and County of Kincardine, and will pass thence northward from, through, or into the said Parish of Durris, in the said County of Kincardine, and the said Parish of Drumoak, in the County of Aberdeen, and will terminate at the said proposed Station, in the said last-mentioned parish, which said last-mentioned approach or road will be carried over the River Dee by a bridge to be constructed at or near the boundary between the estates of Park and Drum, and near to the Duke of Gordon's Monument, to the point marked C on the said Plans to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned.

AND NOTICE IS ALSO HEREBY GIVEN, that it is intended by the said Bill to take powers to deviate from the line or lines of the said several intended works as laid down on the Plans thereof to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned, to such an extent as will be defined or delineated on such Plans, and also to divert certain roads to the extent that will be shown on the same Plans; and also to form a junction with the Rails of the said Aberdeen Railway, at or near the before-mentioned place or point of junction near the Aberdeen Station of the said Railway; and also to cross, vary, divert, and alter the lines or inclinations of, or stop up permanently or temporarily all such turnpike roads, parish or statute-labour roads, highways, railways, tramways, streets, paths, passages, or other roads, rivers, canals, brooks, streams, waters, water-courses, river walls, works, and wastes, situated within the parishes and places aforesaid, or any of them, as it may be necessary to cross, alter, vary, divert, stop up, or interfere with, for the purposes of making and maintaining all or any of the alterations and other works mentioned or referred to in this Notice.

AND NOTICE IS ALSO HEREBY GIVEN, that it is intended by the said Bill to take powers to purchase, by compulsion or otherwise, the lands and houses to be described on the Plans to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned, and other lands, houses, rights of ferry, and hereditaments, for the several purposes mentioned in this Notice, and to confer other powers in respect of the purchase and sale of such lands, houses, and rights, and the consideration to be paid or secured for the same: And also, to take powers to alter, vary, or extinguish all exist-

ing, reserved, or future rights and privileges in or over or connected with the lands, houses, ferries, public and other works and property to be purchased or affected; or in, over, or connected with any of the Railways or Works of the Aberdeen Railway Company, which would in any way impede or interfere with the objects of the said Bill, or any of them: And also, to vary or extinguish all other rights and privileges, which might in any wise impede or interfere with the attainment of the objects to be authorized by the said Bill.

AND NOTICE IS HEREBY ALSO GIVEN, that it is intended, by the said Bill so to be applied for, to make provision for the use, by the Deeside Railway Company, and the Aberdeen Railway Company, of any Station or Stations, and Depots, belonging to, or to be made and acquired by the said Companies, or either of them; and, generally to enable the said Companies to enter into, and carry into effect such arrangements in reference thereto, and for the proper and convenient construction thereof, as may be mutually agreed upon between the said two Companies.

AND NOTICE IS ALSO HEREBY GIVEN, that it is intended, by the said Bill, to grant a farther Term, or to extend the time by the Deeside Railway Act, 1846; and, by the Warrant of the Commissioners of Railways, granted under the powers of the Public Act, 11th Victoria, chapter 3, limited for the compulsory purchase of the Lands by the Deeside Railway Act authorized to be taken, so far as such Lands shall be required for the purposes of the said Bill; and, also, to extend the time for the completion of the Works, by the same Act, authorized to be made.
