THIS day had audience of Her Majesty:—
The Prince di Carini, Envoy Extraordinaryand Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of the
Kingdom of the Two Sicilies, to deliver his credentials;

And Lieutenant-General Sir Julius Hartmann, K.C.B., on a Special Mission to deliver a letter from the King of Hanover, notifying the death of the late King, and announcing his own accession to the Throne;

To which they were respectively introduced by Viscount Palmerston, G.C.B., Her Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs.

The Queen has been pleased to appoint Robert Duncan Wilmot, Esq. to be Surveyor-General for the Province of New Brunswick.
