THE Queen has been pleased to grant unto William Heriot-Maitland-Dougall (heretofore William Heriot-Mattland Dougan (neretore William Heriot-Maitland), of Scotscraig, in the county of Fife, Esquire, a Commander in the Royal Navy, and to Elizabeth Kinnear, his wife, eldest of the three daughters and co-heirs of William Stark Dougall, late of Scotscraig aforesaid, Esquire, deceased, Her royal licence and authority that they may, in compliance with an obligation contained in a certain deed of agreement, bearing date the 1st day of November 1851, continue to use the surname of Dougall, in addition to and after that of Maitland, that he, the said William Heriot-Maitland-Dougall, may bear the arms of Dougall of Scotscraig, quarterly with those of Maitland, and that such surname and arms may in like manner be taken, borne, and used by the issue of their marriage; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise the said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:
