WHITEHALL, January 5, 1852.

THE Queen has been pleased to grant unto William Heriot-Maitland-Dougall (heretofore William Heriot-Maitland), of Scotsraig, in the county of Fife, Esquire, a Commander in the Royal Navy, and to Elizabeth Kinnear, his wife, eldest of the three daughters and co-heirs of William Stark Dougall, late of Scotsraig aforesaid, Esquire, deceased, Her royal licence and authority that they may, in compliance with an obligation contained in a certain deed of agreement, bearing date the 1st day of November 1851, continue to use the surname of Dougall, in addition to and after that of Maitland, that he, the said William Heriot-Maitland-Dougall, may bear the arms of Dougall of Scotsraig, quarterly with those of Maitland, and that such surname and arms may in like manner be taken, borne, and used by the issue of their marriage; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise the said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.

Port of Plymouth.

We, the undersigned Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under the authority of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the Customs," appoint the following place, within the port of Plymouth, to be a legal quay for the lading and unloading of goods, and we do hereby declare the bounds and extent of such quay to be as follows; that is to say:

All that open place, quay, or wharf, at Plymouth, in the county of Devon, situate on the north side of Sutton Harbour, and called North Quay, extending in length eastwardly from Sutton Wharf five hundred and seventy feet, and averaging in breadth fifty feet or thereabouts, including what has been heretofore known as Page's Quay.
