AT the Court at Windsor, the 28th day of December 1852,

'The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HER Majesty in Council was this day pleased to declare the Right Honourable Granville George Earl Granville Lord President of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and his Lordship took his place at the Board accordingly.

This day the Right Honourable Sir William Molesworth, Bart.; the Right Honourable Sir John Yonng, Bart.; and the Right Honourable Edward Cardwell, were by Her Majesty's command sworn of Her Majesty's Mast Honourable Privy Council, and took their respective places at the Board accordingly.

Her Majesty in Council was this day pleased to deliver the Great Seal to the Right Honourable Robert Monsey, Lord Cranworth, whereupon the wath of Lord Chancellor of Great Britain was, by Her Majesty's command, administered to his Lorilship; and his Lordship took his place at the Board aceordingly.

Her Majcsty having been pleased to appoint the Most Noble Henry Duke of Newcastle, the Right Honourable John Russell (commonly called Lord John Russell), and the Right Honourable Henry John Viscount Palmerston, to be three of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, they were this day, by Her Majesty's command, sworn three of Her Majesty's Principal Sccretaries of State accordingly.

## Port of Teignmouth.

Limits of Port and Legal Quay.
We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, inder the authority of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the Customs," appoint Teignuouth to be a Port in that part of the said United Kingdom colled England; and we do hereby deelare that the limits of the said Port shall commence at Langstone Point, in the county of Devon, being the western limit of the Port of Exeter, and shall extend from thence in a southerly direction to a point of land in the said county, called Galmpton Point, at the south end of Broad Sands, in the Bay of Turbay, being the eastern extremity of the Port of Dartmouth, and shall include all bays, channels, roads, bars, strands, larbours, lavens, rivers, streams, creeks, and places within the said limits contained, and shall extend out to sea a distance of three miles from low water-mark, along the coast, within the aforesaid limits.

And We, the said Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do hereby appoint the following places within the said Port of Teignmouth to be a legal quay for the lading and unlading of goods; and we do herely declare the bounds and extent of such quay to be as follows, that is to say, -all that open place, quay, or wharfat Teignmouth, commonly called or known as the New Quay, situate in East Teignmouth, being in length on the north side one hundred and fifty-one feet, and on the south side one hundred and thirty-five feet, and in breadth eighty-nine feet, and except so
