5th September 1853.

THIS Evening, at Ten Minutes past Seven o'Clock, Her Most Gracious Majesty THE QUEEN, accompanied by His Royal Highness The PRINCE ALBERT, and Their Royal Highnesses The PRINCE OF WALES and PRINCE ALFRED, and Suite, arrived at Her Majesty's Royal Palace of Holyrood.

On Her Majesty's arrival at the Terminus of the Caledonian Railway a Royal Salute was fired from the Gun of the Castle, and also, on entering the Palace, from the Guns in The Park.
