THIS Evening, at Half-past Six o'Clock, Her Most Gracious Majesty **THE QUEEN**, accompanied by His Royal Highness **The PRINCE ALBERT**, and Their Royal Highnesses **The PRINCE OF WALES** and **PRINCE ALFRED**, and Suite, arrived at Her Majesty's Castle of Balmoral.

The following ADDRESSES have been presented to **THE QUEEN**, through Earl Granville, which Addresses Her Majesty was pleased to receive in the most gracious manner :—

To **THE QUEEN'S** Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, the Vice-Presidents and Members of the Royal Dublin Society, incorporated for the promotion of Husbandry and other useful Arts in Ireland, request permission to offer the homage of our loyal congratulations on this your Majesty's second visit to the metropolis of this part of your dominions.

Bearing in grateful remembrance the exhilarating influence of your royal presence amongst us at a period when a large portion of our population were suffering under a mysterious dispensation of Providence, we anticipate the gratification your Majesty will now experience in contemplating the improved condition of your Irish Subjects, and in witnessing exertions being made, individual and general, by means of which industry is stimulated, self-reliance is encouraged, and art and science are applied to the improvement of the soil and to the development of native resources.

To His Royal Highness PRINCE ALBERT.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, the Vice-Presidents and Members of the Royal Dublin Society, beg permission to tender to your Royal Highness our unfeigned respects, together with our cordial congratulations on this your second visit to the metropolis of Ireland, in company with our Gracious Sovereign.

Associated for the promotion of Husbandry, and other useful arts in Ireland, our Society has been long instrumental in holding periodical Exhibitions of Arts, Manufactures, and Industry, a practice which has of late derived additional importance in the estimation of the public from the successful issue of that great undertaking of the year 1851, for the inception of which Great Britain and the World are indebted to the patriotic discernment of your Royal Highness.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

During the month of September of the present year, a light-ship will be placed on the Copperground (Köbbergrund) in the Cattegat, in lat. $57^{\circ} 8\frac{1}{2}'$ north and long. $11^{\circ} 20\frac{1}{2}'$ east of Greenwich.

This vessel which has two masts schooner-rigged, and whose sides will be painted red, with a white cross, will be moored S. E. to S. 3 or 4 cable lengths from the so-called Nyvager (new vane-buoy.)

The vessel will show three lights.

Further notice will be given as soon as the lights are burning.

After Our Hearty Commendations.

By virtue of the powers vested in us under the 5th section of the Customs Tariff Act, 16 and 17 Victoria, cap. 106, to remit and re-impose the duties levied on unenumerated articles legally importable into the Isle of Man, these are to authorize you, under the said section of the Customs Tariff Act, to allow all articles enumerated in the Tariff of the United Kingdom, and not enumerated in the Tariff of the Isle of Man, and which, under the Tariff of the Island, would be subject to an *ad valorem* duty of 15 per cent. to be admitted free of duty so long as the Order permitting such free importation shall continue unrescinded. For which this shall be your Warrant.
