GENERAL SUPERINTENDENCY OF HEALTH.

The Chief Magistrate of Health at his ordinary sitting, held the 16th of September, ordains—

That from henceforth vessels coming from Christiana and Lørvigen (places infected by the cholera) are to be subjected to a quarantine of 10 days (should the voyage be unattended by symptoms of disease) for the passengers and goods, with purification in the lazar-houses of the 1st class. Vessels whose voyage may have been attended by symptoms of the disease will be refused entrance; and the rest of the ports of Norway continue to be considered as localities suspected of being infected.

And on other deliberations held the same day, the college above named ordained—

That Lubeck, together with its port of Travemunde (places suspected of being infected by the cholera), be subjected to a quarantine of 10 days for the passengers only, all their articles of wearing apparel being exposed to the open air on board of the vessel.

The Chief Magistrate of Health, at his ordinary sitting, held the 23d September, ordains—

- I. That from henceforth vessels coming from—
 1. London, as well as the other ports on the banks of the Thames;
 2. From Newcastle;
 3. From Billequay, on the south bank of the Tyne (all of which places are infected

by the cholera, be subjected to a quarantine of 10 days (should the voyage be unattended by symptoms of the disease) for the passengers and goods, with purification in the lazarett-houses of the 1st class. Vessels whose voyages may have been attended by symptoms of the disease will be refused entrance.

II. That vessels coming from the ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain, as well as from the Kingdom of Belgium and Holland (localities suspected of being infected by the cholera) be subjected to a quarantine of 10 days for the passengers only, all their articles of wearing apparel being exposed to the open air on board of the vessel.

III. That the north of France, as well as Gibraltar (localities suspected of being infected by the cholera) be subjected to 7 days observation for passengers only, all their wearing apparel being exposed to the open air on board of the vessel.

We have decreed and do hereby decree:—

Article 1. The proportional rate of 120 times per ton and per kilometre, charged by the Tariff of the 17th of January 1851 for the transport by railway of the following articles, comprised in the 3d class; that is to say:—wheat, vegetables, flour, potatoes, chestnuts, maize, &c. is provisionally reduced to one-half, viz: to 0.6 for all such goods forwarded from Genoa to Turin, and to the intermediate stations.

The fixed rate of 0.20 per quintal, chargeable by the same Tariff, is likewise provisionally abolished for the transmissions aforesaid.

Article 2. The present Decree will take effect from the date of its publication, and will cease to have effect at the end of May next.

The Minister Secretary of State for Public Works is charged with the execution of the present Decree, which is to be registered at the Office of General Control, and published and inserted amongst the Government Acts.

It is hereby made known for the information of the seafaring people, that for the more easily making the Weser Schlüssel buoy, marking the entrance to the Weser, two beacons have been erected on the north-west side of the Island of Wangerooze.

These beacons stand on two of the highest downs of the Island, at a distance from each other of 750 feet in the direction N.E. & S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., and both are in a straight direct line with the Weser Schlüssel buoy.

The south-western Beacon, crowned with a 14 feet square head, stands 54 feet high; the north-eastern beacon stands 50 feet high, and has a round head of 14 feet in diameter.

Vessels coming from the westward and intending to make the first Weser Schlüssel buoy, upon having properly neared the Island of Wangerooze must continue their easterly course until both beacons appear in a direct line in S.W. by W. by compass, and so that the south-western is covered by the north-eastern beacon, and in 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms of low water they will see the first Weser Schlüssel buoy; or, if it should be drifted away, they will be, according to the above directions, close upon the position of the said buoy.

Of I. R. Central Maritime Government, which extends to Foreign Vessels also the obligation to keep a lantern lighted at the foremast, whenever they are in Austrian Maritime Ports, Roads, and Anchorages, during the night,

By virtue of the s. 21 of the Regulation of the 25th January last, No. 8025, relative to signals in Austrian Vessels by night, or in case of fog, all Austrian sailing vessels or steamers, whether of war or for trade, which may be at anchor in Austrian ports, unless they are close to a mole, or anchored in a line (in andana), are bound to keep lighted, from the moment of sunset to that of sunrise, a lantern with plain light (luce naturale) at the foremast, so as to be easily seen from all points of the horizon.

The above obligation, imposed with a view of preventing as far as possible the danger of running down, is now by this present Notification with the said view, and in the way above mentioned, extended also to all Foreign Ships which shall be at night in the ports, roads, and other anchorages of the Austrian coast, in the same manner as is regulated for National vessels, under the penalty of a fine of five florins, convention money, to be recovered from the respective captain or master, for every violation of the above Order, which shall for them be in force on the 1st day of July next. The I. R. port and health officers are directed to provide, as well directly as by the functionaries subordinate to them, for the exact observance and fulfilment of the present regulation.
