DOWNING-STREET-July 20. 1799.

ISPATCHES, of which the following are copy and extract, have been received from Lieutenant-Colonel Robert Craufurd by the Right Honourable Lord Grenville, his Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Foreign Department.

I HAVE the honour to inform your Lordship, that on the 3d instant, a considerable corps of the right wing of General Massena's army under the command of the General of Division Le Courbe, attacked General Yellachitz's position in the Canton of Schweitz; on the whole extent of his front, from the Sill to Schweitz and Brunnen.

The affair lasted the greater part of the day; and although the French at first gained some ground, they were afterwards completely repulfed; and General Yellachitz's corps re-occupied all its former posts, except Brunnen, of which the enemy retained possession on the evening of the 3d, but from whence he was also repulfed the next morning.

Major General Yellachitz bestows great praise on the conduct of the contingent troops of the Cantons of Glavis and Schweitz.

I HAVE much fatisfaction in being able to inform
your Lordship, that in consequence of the total defeat of General Macdonald's army, and the retreat of Moreau, General Haddick's corps, the destination of which has been fo frequently changed, is now decided-ly on the point of entering the Valais.

Extract of a letter from the Right Honourable Lord BRID-PORT, K. B. Admiral of the White, &c. to Evan Nepean, Esq. dated the 16th instant,

You will herewith receive a copy of a letter from the Honourable Henry Curzon, Captain of his Majefty's ship Indefatigable, which is transmitted to you for their Lordships information.

His Majesty's ship Indefatigable, at Sea, May 31. 1799.

BEING in latitude 43 deg. 7 min. north, and longitude 11 deg. west, I fell in with and captured the French privateer brig La Venus, mounting twelve four and two nine-pounders, and manned with one hundred and one men, from Rochfort; had been out nine weeks, and taken the schooner Clarence, from Lisbon bound to London, and a ship, from Lisbon bound to Hamburgh, laden with falt. Copy of fa'letter from Capt. HENRY DIGHY, Commander of his Majesty's ship Alemene, to Evan Nepean, Esq. dated at Sea, the 6th of July, 1799.

I INCLOSE you, for the information of their Lord-fhips, a copy of a letter to Earl St Vincent. The privateer therein mentioned failed from Passage with Le Bordelais French ship privateer, and Le Grand Decide brig; they were victualled for three months, and were to return themselves, and send their prizes to Passage.

MY LORD, His Majesty's ship Alcemene, July 6. 1799. RECEIVING information of feveral large privateers that had been hovering on the coast of Portugal having

gone to the westward, I thought it expedient, for the commercial interest, to exceed the limits of my station, and on the 22d of June, in latitude 38 deg. 50 min. north; long. 31 deg. west, a ship boarding an American was seen, which I chased; she parting, the American made to and told me she was French, then distant two leagues. The weather being clear I faw his manœuvres, and acted accordingly throughout the night, and by using every possible exertion I got round the Island of Corvo, incalms and light winds; on the 23d the enemy, equally active in his endeavours to avoid; preserved his distance by towing and sweeping to the westward. On the 24th and 25th I passed two English brigs, and upwards of 40 fail of merchant vessels, steering for Lifbon. A breeze from the northward on the 26th brought me by fix in the morning within gun-shot of the enemy; a running fight commencing, she struck after. seven, in latitude 39 deg. 29 min. north, longitude 33 deg. west, having suffered in her hull, sails, and rigging; is named the Courageux, of Bourdeaux, pierced for 32, but carrying only 28 twelves and nine-pounders, (of which some were thrown overboard during the chace,) with 253 men, commanded by Jean Bernard ; 23 days last from Passage, expressly to intercept a Brazil con-

Earl of St Vincent, K. B. Admiral of the White, &c. Copy of a letter from Vice-Admiral Harvey, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels in the Leeward Islands, dated June 8, 1799, to EVEAN NEPEAN, ESQ.

You will be pleased to acquaint their Lordships, that Captain Ekins, of his Majesty's ship Amphitrite, captured on the 22d ultimo, to windward of Antigua, Le Duquesne French privateer coppered brig, of 16 guns, nine-pounders, and 129 men, belonging to Guadaloupe, which he fent to Barbadoes.

This vessel had been out but three days, and made no captures. She was bound on a cruize to windward of the Islands, is a very fast failer, and one of the finest. privateers in these seas.

Extract of a Letter from Admiral Lord Duncan, Commander. in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels in the North Seas, to Evan Nepean, Esq. dated off the Texel, July 17, 1799.

I TRANSMIT, for their Lordships information, ano-

ther letter from Captain Winthrop, of his Majesty's ship Circe; much praise is due to him and the officers under his command, for their spirit, enterprise, and good conduct, on this as well as on a former occasion.

MYLORD, Circe, off Ameland, July 11.

I FEEL great pleasure in acquainting your Lordship,

that the boats of our little squadron + made another dash into the Watt, at the back of Ameland last night, and brought out three valuable veffels deeply laden with fugar, wine, and brandy; they also burnt a large galliot, laden with brass ordnance and stores, which could not be brought off, notwithstanding the perseverance of Captain Mackenzie, to whom I am very much indebted for his coolness and judgment in the management of this affair; and also to Captain Boorder, whose local know-ledge has been of great use to me. Lieutenant Searle, who commanded a schoot converted into a gun-boat, and Lieutenant Pawle, who commanded the Circe's boats, upon this as well as upon a former occasion, conducted themselves very much to my satisfaction, as did the honest fellows under their command, who were at their oars 15 or 16 hours in a very hot day, opposed to an enemy of superior force; but I am happy to say not I have the honour to be, &c. a man was hurt. I HAVE the honour to inform you, that on the 20th-instant, the Scaw bearing S. S. W. distance eight leagues, at two A. M. I fell in with and captured the French lugger privateer L'Hirondelle, mounting five guns, two fwivels, and twenty-fix men; three weeks-from Dunkirk, and had taken nothing.—I am, &c. J. WOOD.

Archibald Dickson, Esq. Vice-Admiral, &c. Copy of a Letter from Captain Wollaston, of his Majesty's sloop Cruizer, to Evan Nepean, Esq. dated Leith Roads, July 15. 1799.

I BEG leave to acquaint you, for the information of their Lordships, that on the 13th instant, in latitude 56 deg. north, I fell in with and captured, after a chace: of three hours, the French lugger privateer Le Courageux, of fourteen guns and forty-feven men, belonging: to Dunkirk; out fix weeks, and had taken four prizes, one of which I recaptured on the evening of the 12th.
