Limits of Port and Legal Quays.

We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under the authority of "The Consolidated Customs Act, 1853," appoint Wells to be a Port in that part of the United Kingdom called England; and we do hereby declare that the limits of the said port shall commence at Sand Hole Gap, about half a mile to the westward of Brancaster Channel, and shall extend from thence, in an easterly direction along the coast, to Sparrow Gap, a breach in the cliff about half-way between Weybourne and Steningham, and shall include all rivers, bays, harbours, and creeks within the said limits, and shall extend out to sea a distance of three miles from low-water mark along the coast, within the aforesaid limits.

And we, the said Lords Commissioners, do hereby appoint and declare all that open place, quay, or wharf, at Wells, commonly called or known by the name of the Quay of Wells-juxta-Mare, extending in length from a granary or coal-store belonging to, and in the occupation of Robinson Parker, on the east, to the life-boat house belonging to the Harbour Commissioners, on the west, one thousand and twenty feet, and being in breadth forty feet or thereabouts, to be the Legal Quay, within the said Port of Wells, for the lading and unloading of goods.

And we, the said Lords Commissioners, do hereby annul all former limits of the said Port of Wells, and also of the Ports of Clay and Blakeney, and Clay, and all former Legal Quays set out and appointed within the said ports respectively.
