AT the Court at Windsor, the 29th day of December 1853,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the eleventh section of "The Merchant Shipping Law Amendment Act, 1853," it was enacted that upon the erection of any new Lighthouse, Her Majesty might, by Order in Council, fix such toll in respect thereof to be paid by the Master or Owner of every ship which should pass the same, or derive benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty might deem reasonable, and might from time to time alter the amount thereof;

And whereas a certain lighthouse has been placed by the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses in the harbour of Loch Ryan, on the south side of the basin of the Clyde, and a certain toll in respect thereof upon vessels arriving at, or departing from any port within Loch Ryan was sanctioned by Order in Council dated the nineteenth day of December one thousand eight hundred and forty-six;

And whereas the said Commissioners are about to erect and light another light on the Island of Devaar, on the north side of the said basin;

Now therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct—

That the toll payable in respect of the said light in Loch Ryan, by virtue of the said Order in Council of the nineteenth day of December one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, shall remain as fixed by that Order; and that upon the erection and lighting of the said light upon the Island of Devaar, there shall be paid in respect thereof, for every vessel belonging to the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland (the same not belonging to Her Majesty, or being navigated wholly in ballast), and for every Foreign vessel which, by any Act of Parliament, Order in Council, Convention, or Treaty, shall be privileged to enter the ports of the United Kingdom upon paying the same duties of tonnage as are paid by British vessels, the same not being navigated wholly in ballast, which shall pass or derive benefit from the said last-mentioned lighthouse, that is, which shall arrive at, or depart from any port or place in the Bay or Loch of Campbeltown, if the burthen of the same shall not exceed fifty tons, sixpence, and if

the same shall exceed fifty tons, for each additional fifty tons, or part of fifty tons, sixpence.

And in respect of the said lights on Devaar and in Loch Ryan, there shall be paid by every vessel before described, and under the exemptions aforesaid, which shall navigate on a distinct voyage within the great basin of the Clyde, bounded by a line drawn from the point of Corsewall to Glenarm, in Ireland, on the south-east; and from another line, drawn from Mull of Kintyre to Fairhead, in Ireland, on the north-west; and on all other sides by the coasts of Ireland and Scotland, surrounding the said basin, a similar rate of toll to that above set forth, being at the rate of three pence for each of the said lights, and double the said respective tolls for every Foreign vessel, not privileged as aforesaid.

Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be held to charge any vessel arriving at, or departing from any port or place within Loch Ryan, or arriving at, or departing from any port or place within the Loch of Campbeltown, with more than the single rates applicable to such vessels hereinbefore set forth or referred to.

Provided further, that the said tolls, in respect of the said lights, shall be levied by the said Commissioners, subject to the regulations contained in a Table of Tolls prepared by the said Commissioners, in terms of the provisions in that behalf contained, in the said recited Act, and sanctioned by an Order in Council dated the eighth day of January one thousand eight hundred and fifty, so far as the same may be applicable to the said tolls.

And whereas by the Customs Consolidation Act, 1853, an Act of the eighth and ninth Victoria, chapter ninety-three, entitled "An Act to regulate the trade of the British possessions abroad," was repealed, and by the Act now in recital, books wherein the copyright is subsisting, first composed, or written or printed, in the United Kingdom, and printed or reprinted in any other Country, are absolutely prohibited to be imported into the British possessions abroad; but it is thereby provided that nothing therein contained shall be taken to prevent Her Majesty from exercising the power to suspend, in certain cases, such prohibition, vested in Her by the tenth and eleventh Victoria, chapter ninety-five, entitled "An Act to amend the law relating to the protection in the Colonies, of works entitled to copyright in the United Kingdom."

And whereas by the last recited Act it is enacted that in case the Legislature, or proper legislative authorities in any British possession, shall be disposed to make due provision for securing or protecting the rights of British authors in such possessions, and shall pass an Act or make an Ordinance for that purpose, and shall transmit the same in the proper manner to the Secretary of State, in order that it may be submitted to Her Majesty, and in case Her Majesty shall be of opinion that such Act or Ordinance is sufficient for the purpose of securing to British authors reasonable protection within such possession, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, if she think fit so to do, to express Her royal approval of such Act or Ordinance, and thereupon to issue an Order in Council declaring that so long as the provisions of such Act or Ordinance continue in force within such colony, the prohibitions contained in the aforesaid Acts of the fifth and sixth Victoria, and eighth and ninth Victoria, or in any other Acts against the importing, selling, letting out to hire, exposing for sale or hire, or possessing Foreign reprints of books first composed, written, printed, or published in the United Kingdom, and entitled to copyright therein, shall be suspended, so far as regards such colony, and thereupon such Act or Ordinance shall come into operation, except so far as may be otherwise provided therein, or may be otherwise directed by such Order in Council.

And whereas an Act has been passed by the Governor, Council, and Assembly of the Island of Jamaica (No. 3924), "to secure and protect in the Island, the rights of British authors, and for carrying into effect the provisions of the Act of the Imperial Parliament, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the tenth and eleventh years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter ninety-five," whereby provision is made for protecting the rights of British authors in the said colony.

And whereas Her Majesty hath expressed Her royal approval of the said Act:

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, and by the authority of the same, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that so long as the said Act shall remain and continue in force within the said Island, all prohibitions in any of the said hereinbefore recited Acts of the Imperial Parliament, or in any other Acts thereof contained, against the importing into the said Island, or against the selling, letting out to hire, exposing for sale or hire, or possessing therein Foreign reprints of books first composed, written, printed, or published

in the United Kingdom, and entitled to copyright therein, shall be suspended, so far as regards the said Island.

And the Most Noble the Duke of Newcastle, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

And whereas Her Majesty has expressed Her royal approval of the said Act;

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, and by the authority of the same, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that so long as the said Act shall remain and continue in force within the said colony, all prohibitions in any of the said hereinbefore recited Acts of the Imperial Parliament, or in any other Acts thereof contained, against the importing into the said colony, or against the selling, letting out to hire, exposing for sale or hire, or possessing therein, Foreign reprints of books first composed, written, printed, or published in the United Kingdom, and entitled to copyright therein, shall be suspended, so far as regards the said colony.

And the Most Noble the Duke of Newcastle, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

(Staatsblad No. 139.) Decree of 23d December 1853, relative to measures for the encouragement of the Import of Grain and other Provisions.

We, William III., &c., &c., &c.,

HAVING taken into consideration that in consequence of the special measures adopted by neighbouring States to encourage the import of grain and other provisions, it has become necessary

TREASURY WARRANT.

Whereas by an Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the Duties of Postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or Inland Postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of Foreign or Colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage, according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid; and it is provided that the power thereby given, should extend to any increase, or reduction, or remission of postage.

And whereas, in pursuance, and in exercise of the power or authority given to the Commissioners

likewise in this Country to adopt extraordinary means to encourage the import of said articles.

Having seen our Decree of 15th September 1853, (Staatsblad No. 103), and attending to Art. 2 of the Law of 19th June 1845 (Staatsblad No. 28):

Having heard the Council of State, and in common concert with the States-General,

Have decreed, and do decree,

Art. i. The levying of the duties on the importation of potatoes and millet, as fixed by Tariff added to the Law of 19th June 1845 (Staatsblad No. 28), and of the duties on the importation of wheat and peeled spelt, rye, maize, or Turkish corn, barley and malt, buck-wheat, oats, and unpeeled spelt, beans, tares, peas, and lentils, groats, grits, and peeled barley, as fixed by Art. 2 of the Law of 30th May 1847 (Staatsblad No. 24), and by the Law of 3d March 1852 (Staatsblad No. 19), is suspended till the 1st October 1854.

Art. ii. Till the above-mentioned period the duties on the importation of the named grains and provisions will be levied as follows:—

of Her Majesty's Treasury, in and by the said recited Act, a certain Warrant under the hands of two of the said Commissioners, and dated the 19th day of July 1852, was made, by which letters are authorized to be transmitted between the United Kingdom and the German Postal Union, and between any Foreign Country, through any part of the German Postal Union, and any place in the United Kingdom, and between the German Postal Union and any of Her Majesty's Colonies, or any Foreign Country through the United Kingdom, and between any Foreign Country through any part of the German Postal Union, and any of Her Majesty's Colonies, or any Foreign Country through the United Kingdom (the said respective letters being conveyed between the United Kingdom and Belgium by packet boat), at the rates of postage therein mentioned. And whereas the States of Schoumburg-Lippe and Lippe-Detmold have since joined the German Postal Union.

Now we, the undersigned, being two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do, in exercise of the power or authority in us for such purpose vested, in and by the said recited Act, and of all other powers and authorities enabling us in this behalf, direct that from henceforth the term "German Postal Union" used in the said recited Warrant of the 19th day of July 1852, shall in all cases be construed, deemed, and taken to include the states of Schoumburg-Lippe, and Lippe-Detmold, in like manner, in all respects, as if those States had been included in the German Postal Union at the date of the said Warrant of the 19th day of July 1852; and we hereby revoke, annul, and make void any declaration, exception, matter or thing in such Warrant contained to the contrary thereof.

Provided, and we hereby declare and direct that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, or any two of them, by Warrant under their hands, at any time hereafter to alter or repeal the regulations hereby made, and to make and establish any new or other regulations in lieu thereof.
