(Copy.) NOTICE TO MARINERS.

THE Minister of Marine gives notice:—
1stly. That the red buoy on the North Pampus of the mouth of Goeree has been substituted by a black buoy, and is likewise now placed northwesterly in the following direct as:—

The steeple of Brielle, in the rood of Rockanje, and the church steeple of Helvoetsluys, in the small wood at the Kwak;

Soundings:—Goeree S. W. & W. Helvoetsluys S. E.

by unadjusted compass, at the depth of 52 palms at ordinary low water, which bouy, when entering, has to be kept on the larboard side.

2ndly. That at the dry north-easterly point of the Scheelhoek Bank a white buoy is stationed, in the following directions:—

The steeple of Goeree, on the eastern side of the pier head of said place; and the Pilot Office of Helvoetsluys, touching the point of the Kwak;

3rdly. That the white buoy stationed at the north point of the bank Scheelhoek, termed the North Pampus, has been furnished with a white flag on a pole, in order to its being better distinguished from the before-mentioned white buoy.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Minister at Brussels, enclosing copies of two Laws which have received the Royal sanction, of which the subjoined are translations:—The first, authorising the Government to regulate temporarily the Import Duties on Coal, with a Decree, consequent thereon, suppressing those Duties; and the second, regus

lating the terms of importation and exportation of certain Articles of Food.

Law authorising the Government to regulate temporarily the Import Duties on Coal.

Art I. The Government is authorised to reduce, to suspend entirely, and to re-impose the import duties on coal.

Art. 11. The powers conferred by the preceding Article shall cease on 31st December 1854, unless previously renewed; and, in case of non-renewal, the General Tariff shall come again into force at that date.

Art. III. The measures taken to carry out the present Law shall be submitted, within one month after their date, to the approval of the Chambers, if sitting, and if not sitting, in the course of their next session.
