The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Foreign Plantations have received, through the Commissioners of Northern Light-houses, a Notice issued by the American Light-house Board (copy of which is annexed,) relative to the proposed changes in the lights at Cape Hatteras, Body's Island, and Ocracoke.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Changes of Lights at Cape Hatteras, Body's Island, and Ocracoke (Coast of North Carolina.)

In conformity to the Notice to Mariners issued from the Office of the Light-house Board at Washington, under date of December 1st, 1853, notice is hereby given, that the proposed changes will take place simultaneously at the three above-named Light-houses on the night of the 1st of June next (1854).

CAPE HATTERAS.

The Cape Hatteras Light will be a First Order Fresnel Flashing Lens, exhibiting, in every 20 seconds of time, a brilliant white flash of 8 seconds' duration, followed by a total eclipse of 12 seconds' duration.

At the distance of 14 to 18 miles the duration of the flash will be somewhat less, and that of the eclipse proportionably greater.

The height of the tower from the ground to the top of the lantern is 140 feet.

The colour of the tower from the ground to the height of 20 feet is grey, and the remainder red.

The tower is placed about two miles from the point of the Cape, on the southward and eastward extremity of a long ridge of white and naked sand, backed by woods.

The space of about two miles between the light-house and the pitch of the Cape, is a low, flat, and bare sand beach, very little above extreme high water.

The light will be 150 feet above the level of the sea, and should be seen in good weather from a position 15 feet above the water, at the distance of about 19 nautical or 22 statute miles.

The approximate position of the Cape Hatteras Light-house, as determined by the Coast Survey, is—latitude $35^{\circ} 15' 11''$ north, longitude $75^{\circ} 30' 33''$ west from Greenwich.

BODY'S ISLAND.

The Body's Island Light, about 32 nautical miles to the northward of Cape Hatteras, will be changed at the same time (June 1st, 1854), to a Fourth Order Fresnel Fixed White Light, varied by alternate red and white flashes.

This light will be 50 feet above the level of the sea, and the white flashes should be seen in good weather from a position 15 feet above the water, at the distance of about 13 nautical or 15 statute miles; the fixed light not quite so far as the white flashes, and the red flashes at a less distance than the fixed white light.

The approximate position of Body's Island Light, as determined by the Coast Survey, is—latitude $35^{\circ} 47' 20''.5$ north, longitude $75^{\circ} 31' 20''$ west from Greenwich.



OCRACOCKE.

The Ocracoke Light, about $23\frac{1}{2}$ nautical miles to the southward and westward of Cape Hatteras Light-house, will be changed at the same time (June 1st, 1854), to a Fourth Order Fresnel Fixed White Light.

This light will be 75 feet above the level of the sea, illuminate the entire horizon, and should be seen, in good weather, from a position 15 feet above the water, at the distance of about $14\frac{1}{2}$ nautical or $16\frac{1}{2}$ statute miles.

The approximate position of Ocracoke Light-house, as determined by the Coast Survey, is—latitude $35^{\circ} 06' 31''$ north, longitude $75^{\circ} 58' 27''$ west from Greenwich.
