HER Majesty in Council was this day pleased to declare the Right Honourable John Russell (commonly called Lord John Russell), Lord President of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and his Lordship took his place at the Board accordingly.

Her Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Most Noble Henry Pelham, Duke of Newcastle, and the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., to be two of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, they were this day, by Her Majesty's command, sworn two of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State accordingly.

At the Court at Buckingham-Palace, the 8th day of June 1854,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the "Foreign Deserters' Act, 1852," it is provided, that whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British Merchant Ships in the territories of any Foreign Power, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from Merchant Ships belonging to a subject of such Power, when within Her Majesty's dominions or the territories of the East India Company, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such Order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient.

And whereas it hath been made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen (not being Hanoverian subjects,) who desert from British Merchant Ships in the territories belonging to His Majesty the King of Hanover :

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters' Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from

and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, seamen, not being slaves (and not being British subjects), who desert from Merchant Ships belonging to subjects of the King of Hanover within Her Majesty's dominions or the territories of the East India Company, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Commissioners for the Affairs of India, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

It is hereby notified that the Right Honourable the Earl of Clarendon, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received a Despatch from Vice-Admiral Dundas, Commanding Her Majesty's Naval Forces in the Black Sea, addressed to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and dated the first of June, announcing that the Danube was blockaded by the combined Naval Forces of Her Majesty and of the Emperor of the French.

DESPATCHES, of which the following are Copies or Extracts, have been received from Vice-Admiral Dundas, C. B., Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean and Black Sea :—

PRESENT STATE OF THE FORTS ON THE COASTS OF CIRCASSIA AND GEORGIA.

No. 229.

Britannia, off Baljik,
May 25, 1854.

I BEG you will acquaint the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty that the Mogador arrived yesterday from Redoubt Kalé, on the coast of Georgia, having left Sir Edmund Lyons with the Agamemnon, Charlemagne, Sampson, and Highflyer there on the 20th instant, and I expect him to-night or to-morrow morning.

2. I have not yet received Sir Edmund Lyons' official despatches, which shall be forwarded as soon as I get them ; but the result of his movements appears to be, that from the entrance of the Sea of Azof to the Turkish Asiatic Boundary, the flag of Russia only flies over the fortresses of

Anapa and Soujak, and the only two vessels that were on that coast have been captured, as noted in my letter, No. 214.

3. All the places were evacuated, and the forts and materiel more or less destroyed (many of the guns however being serviceable), except Redoubt Kalé and Poti, from which the Russian soldiers were driven by the fire of the French and English ships, and they were then garrisoned by a battalion of Turkish soldiers who, with three field-pieces, had been previously embarked on board our vessels at St Nicolai (Chefketil). The Russians, about 700 or 800 men, are supposed to have gone in the direction of Khutais, where also the garrison of Soukhum Kalé, 2,000 or 3,000, is supposed to have directed its march.

4. The Sampson is on the coast, and last night the Sans Pareil and two Turkish steamers left for Redoubt Kalé, with arms, ammunition, and 200 or 300 Circassians.

5. I am happy to say that there is an appearance of more unity and stronger feeling among the different tribes against the Russians.

I ACQUAINT you, for the information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that Sir E. Lyons rejoined me this morning from the coasts of Circassia, Georgia, and Anatolia; and I have very great pleasure in transmitting, for their Lordships' information, Sir E. Lyons' official reports of the proceedings of the detachment placed under his orders.

2. The operations therein detailed, as well as the intelligence as to the state of the coasts he has visited, are very important and interesting; and I trust my Lords will consider I have done right in expressing my entire approval of the great skill and judgment displayed by Sir E. Lyons, and his colleague Viscount de Chabannes; and I beg to add my testimony to the ability and conduct of Lieutenant Rolland, of the Agamemnon, of whom Sir E. Lyons has made such honourable mention.

SIR,

*Agamemnon, at Redoute Kaleh,
May 21, 1854.*

I HAVE great pleasure in reporting to you that the small squadron placed under my orders by you and Admiral Hamelin, have been the means of expelling the Russian garrison from the only place on this extensive coast, with the exception of the strongholds of Anapa and Soujak Kaleh, near the Crimea; that the Emperor Nicholas exempted from the general abandonment two months ago.

2. At Soukoum Kaleh I learned that the Russians were still in possession of Redoute Kaleh, and that they attached great importance to maintaining themselves there as long as possible, in order to forward their army at Khutais, a large quantity of ammunition and stores still in the magazines; and at the same time to intercept the communications of Selim Pacha at this critical juncture, and prevent his occupation of so favourable a point for the introduction of supplies.

3. The squadron left Soukoum Kaleh on the morning of the 18th, and as we passed Redoute Kaleh we observed a body of about a thousand infantry under arms, and that the few guns on the sea defences were manned. If we had opened our broadsides we could have obliged the enemy to retire, but he would, no doubt, have returned to re-occupy the place on our disappearing, and I therefore went on with the squadron as fast as possible to Chouruksoo, in hopes of inducing the General commanding there to aid me with a sufficient number to occupy and maintain the place, after we should have driven the enemy out of it with our guns; he sent an express to Selim Pacha, whose reply arrived early on the following morning, and who placed at my disposal a battalion of 800 infantry and 3 field-pieces, which were immediately embarked on board the ships of the squadron with a degree of alacrity I have never seen surpassed.

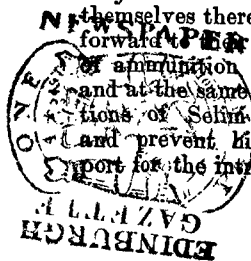
4. At 4 P.M. the squadron re-appeared off Redoute Kaleh, where the troops were disembarked, under cover of the steam-vessels, about two miles from the batteries, and at the same time a summons was sent to the Commander of the Russian forces by Vicomte de Chabannes, the senior officer of the French division of the squadron, and myself, under cover of a flag of truce, and in charge of Lieutenant Maxse, of this ship, by whom it was delivered to an officer who spoke French fluently, and alleged, as the reason why an answer could not be given without considerable delay, that the Commandant was not on the spot.

5. After a delay of nearly half-an-hour Lieutenant Maxse left the shore without an answer, and consequently the Agamemnon and Charlemagne stood in, as close as the depth of water would permit, and opened their fire upon the quarter occupied by the Russian troops, as well as on the sea defences, which tried an ineffectual fire on the boats. The enemy soon retired out of reach of the ships' guns, and the Turkish troops advancing rapidly along the beach, took possession of the batteries, when the firing ceased.

6. The enemy retreated so precipitately from under the fire of the ships, that he failed in his attempt to ignite the combustibles which were laid for the destruction of the Military Quarter, but when out of gun-shot, and his retreat secured by crossing the river and destroying the bridge, he set fire to the magazines and storehouses, and at nightfall the Commercial Town, which commenced at some distance from the sea, and extended about a mile and a half up each bank of the river; was in a blaze, so that in the morning the flourishing place of the evening presented an awful scene of desolation; the Mingrelian inhabitants, who had rendered themselves very obnoxious to the displeasure of the Turks, having retired with the Russians.

7. This devastation is no doubt deeply to be deplored, but it is some consolation to have deprived the enemy of a dépôt of military stores, and to have driven him from a place of so much importance, without any accident, or any irregularity arising from success.

8. Nothing could exceed the cordial co-operation and assistance I received from my French colleague, the Vicomte de Chabannes, as well as from Commandant Wailly of the "Mogador," Captain Jones of the "Sampson," Captain Symonds of this ship, and Captain Moore of the "Highflyer," and indeed from every officer in the combined squadron, during this fatiguing day; but I should be doing injustice to a highly deserving officer, if I did not particularly mention



the senior Lieutenant of the "Agamemnon," William Rue Rolland (a Lieutenant of thirteen years' standing, twelve of which he has been in active service afloat), upon whom a large share of the toil and responsibility of the day devolved, as he had the management of the embarkation and disembarkation of the troops.

9. Yesterday and to-day working parties from the combined squadron have been assisting the Turks in putting the place in a good state of defence, and I am highly pleased with the quantity of work they have accomplished; but as the Russians are probably not far distant, I think it would not be prudent to leave the Turkish garrison without some support, I therefore venture to consider it your pleasure, that on my quitting this anchorage to-night in the further execution of your orders, the Sampson should be left behind for that purpose; and I enclose a copy of the instructions I have given to Captain Jones.

10. I have also the honour to enclose the copy of a letter which the Vicomte Chabannes and I have addressed to the Muchir Selim Pacha, and I have directed Captain Jones to draw his attention to Poti and Agysoo, the dependencies of Redoute Kaleh, which were also set on fire by the enemy on the evening of the 19th instant.

SIR,

WITH reference to my letters of the 17th and 21st instant, Nos. 20 and 21, I feel that my report of the visit of the allied squadron under my orders to the coast of Circassia would be very incomplete if I were not to relate that we were everywhere welcomed as deliverers by the remarkable race by whom it is peopled.

2. The weather was fine, and the water deep, so we approached very near the land, and always by daylight; and as we opened each beautiful valley, with our English and French colours flying, the Circassians flocked to the beach, and testified their joy by firing musquets and waving flags and handkerchiefs.

3. On landing at the principal places the natives assisted us out of our boats, and after giving expression to their delight for a few minutes, formed a circle around us, preserving the most perfect order, while their chiefs came forward and addressed the Vicomte de Chabannes and me, speaking fluently and sensibly, and with an air of self-esteem, which, combined with their handsome and lofty mien, and their manner of carrying their weapons, was exceedingly striking. They invariably said that while they turned towards England and France with gratitude and admiration, as the instruments in the hands of Providence for delivering them from their invaders, they confessed that they considered it the just reward of their patriotism and constancy.

4. They are certainly a fine intelligent race, and I can readily believe them to be second to none in desultory mountain warfare.

The Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State

for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Note from the Prussian Chargé d'Affaires at this Court, inclosing a Notification (a translation of which is subjoined) of the intention of the Prussian Government to level, in July next, a hill which at present serves as a landmark for vessels entering the Harbour of Swinemünde.

NOTIFICATION TO MARINERS.

In the course of the month of July next will be demolished the point near the village of "Osternothafen," consisting of seven tall pine trees, known by the name of "Siebenfichtenberg" (Seven-Pine Mountain), and visible at a distance of 2 or 2½ miles (8 to 10 English miles) to vessels nearing the harbour of Swinemünde from north-east to north.

No other countersign will for the present replace it, and the harbour will henceforth only be recognized by the other usual marks:—The Land Beacons on the *Streckel-and-Kies Mountains*,—the Fire Beacon on the Eastern Moat, —and the Revolving Beacons on the Eastern Strand-down.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

VICTORIA.—(PORT-PHILIP.)

AUSTRALIA, BASS'S STRAITS—REVOLVING LIGHT ON CAPE OTWAY.

Trinity House, London, 20th July 1853.

The following particulars respecting the Revolving Light at Cape Otway (the First exhibition of which, in August 1848, was notified from this House on the 11th April 1849), having been communicated to this Corporation by direction of Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, are hereby made public for the general information of Mariners, viz:—

The Light-house on Cape Otway, in Bass's Strait, is situate in latitude 38° 51' south, and in longitude 143° 29' east. The light revolves, showing a bright flash, once in every minute, and burns at the height of 300 feet above the level of high water, and may be seen by estimation at the distance of eight leagues.

Mariners are requested to observe that the Reef off Cape Otway lies about one-half or three-quarters of a mile therefrom, in a S.E. to S.S.W. direction, and extends one and a quarter miles to the westward.

ADDITIONAL LIGHT-HOUSE AT THE ENTRANCE TO PORT-PHILIP.

The second Light-house at Shortland's Bluff being now nearly completed, Mariners are requested to take notice that on and after the first

day of January next, a *Fixed Red Light* will be exhibited thereon from sunset to sunrise.

The leading Light-house Tower is built of wood, painted white, and stands at an elevation of eighty (80) feet above the level of the water, bearing from the centre of the upper lighthouse on Shortland's Bluff south thirty-three degrees west, distant six hundred and seventy (670) feet.

The leading light will be seen in ordinary weather ten (10) miles to seaward, within the bearings of south one quarter west round (westerly) to south-west one quarter west.

The two Light-houses by day, and lights by night, kept in one line of bearing, lead in mid-channel between Points Lonsdale and Nepean; but strangers are cautioned not to attempt the entrance by night, nor against the strength of the ebb tide by day.

BEACON ON SWAN POINT.

Mariners are requested to take notice that a Cone-shaped Iron Beacon, painted white, elevated fifty (50) feet above the level of the water, has been erected on Swan Point, bearing from the low Light-house on Shortland's Bluff north forty-one (41) degrees east. This beacon, kept open to the eastward of the low Light-house, leads in clear of Point Lonsdale Reef, and the flagstaff on Shortland's Bluff, kept half a cable's length open to the westward of the low Light-house leads in clear of the Corsair Rock, and the other sunken dangers lying off Point Nepean; but in all practicable cases, Mariners waiting the turn of tide, entering or leaving the harbour, are recommended to keep the Point Lonsdale shore aboard, as the tide there runs fairer, and in bad weather small vessels incur less risk on the Point Lonsdale shore from the tide ripples than towards Point Nepean.

No alteration has taken place in the Upper Light-house on Shortland's Bluff, which is, as heretofore, a bright stationary light, one hundred and nine (109) feet above the level of the water, seen in ordinary weather twenty (20) miles to seaward, within the bearings of south round by west to south-west by west.

The bearings are by compass, and heights at mean high water.

FLOATING LIGHTSHIP, HOBSON'S BAY.

A Floating Light is established at the north end of the West Channel leading into Port-Philip Bay, in the same position as that hitherto occupied by the North Fairway Buoy, which is now removed.

The Lightship is painted *Red*, and exhibits, between sunset and sunrise, two (2) Bright Lights, twenty-four (24) feet apart, and fifty (50) feet above the level of the water.

These Lights may be seen from all parts of the horizon, within the distance of nine (9) miles in clear weather.

Vessels approaching the Lightship by night or by day, are warned to be cautious in avoiding collision.

The Lightship is moored in four (4) fathoms at low water, with the following magnetic bearings:—

Extreme point of Indented Head N.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ N.

Summit of Arthur's Seat S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E.

Extremity of Point Nepean S.S.W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

ANONYMA ROCK, IN PORT-PHILIP BAY.

Commanders of vessels working up the east-side of Port-Philip Bay, are requested to take notice that a Chequered Buoy has been placed upon the Eight Foot Rock off the Red Bluff,

which has been ascertained to lie nearly two (2) miles closer in shore than the position assigned to it in the charts. Commanders are recommended to notice the following bearings, and lay the rock's position down on their charts.

Magnetic Position of the Anonyma Rock.

Light-house, Gellibrand's Point, N.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ N.

Centre of the Red Bluff, E. by S.

A small white cliff, some distance north of the Red Bluff, N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

The Anonyma Rock lies a mile off shore, the least water on it being eight (8) feet at low tide, with five (5) fathoms just outside, and a clear passage half a mile on the inside of it, with three (3) and four (4) fathoms, sandy bottom.

CORSAIR ROCK.

A dangerous Rock, with only eleven (11) feet of water over it at low tide, has recently been discovered nearly three-quarters of a mile west of Point Nepean. It is not laid down in any of the charts of this port. Commanders of vessels navigating between the Heads are requested to observe the following marks in order to avoid the said rock (which will hereafter be known as the "Corsair Rock"), and are recommended to lay down its position on their charts as given underneath.

Magnetic Position of the centre of the Corsair Rock.

Upper Light-house on Shortland's Bluff, N. 21 E.

Middle of the Rocky Islet off Point Nepean, N. 87 E.

Tidal Flagstaff on Point Lonsdale, N. 76 W.

The above rock is about twenty (20) feet in diameter; the least water found over it at low tide is eleven (11) feet, with three (3), four (4), and five (5) fathoms water all round.

There is a clear passage between the Corsair Rock and the extreme end of Nepean Reef, of about a cable's length, with three (3), four (4), and five (5) fathoms of water; but no vessel should ever attempt it, as the tide, both ebb and flood, sets with great force on Nepean Reef.

Marks to clear the Corsair Rock.

In working out between the Heads, keep the flagstaff on Observatory Point open half a cable's length with the lowest part of Nepean Point, until Shortland's Bluff flagstaff is half a cable's length open to the westward of the low Light-house; which latter mark must be kept on until you open out Nepean Rock to the eastward of that point, when you are out clear of the rock and Nepean Reef.

In working in between the Heads, keep Shortland's Bluff flagstaff half a cable's length open to the westward of the low Light-house, until you have the flagstaff on Observatory Point half a cable's length open to the lowest part of Point Nepean, which will lead you clear of the Corsair Rock; but to clear Nepean Reef, which lies a cable's length inside the rock, do not shut in the low Light-house with Shortland's Bluff flagstaff, until you open out the Nepean Rock to the westward of that point, when you are in clear of the reef.

NOTICE TO COMMANDERS OF VESSELS IN HOBSON'S BAY.

Commanders of vessels are requested to take notice that, for the purpose of enabling them to rate their chronometers, a Time Ball, painted black, will be dropped daily (Sundays excepted), from the top of the flagstaff at Gellibrand's Point, at the instant of one o'clock mean solar time, there corresponding to 15h. 20m. 19s. Greenwich time.

As a preparatory signal, a blue pennant will be hoisted at the mast-head at half-past twelve, and hauled down at ten minutes to one o'clock, when the Ball will be run up to the mast-head and dropped as above.

In the event of its being necessary at any time to suspend the dropping of the Time Ball, either from strength of wind or any casualty occurring to the apparatus, this will be indicated by a white pennant being hoisted instead of the blue preparatory pennant.

Assigned position of the Time Ball, lat. 37*d.* 52*m.* 42*s.* S. long., 144*d.* 55*m.* 28*s.* E.

TIDAL SIGNALS.

A flagstaff having been erected at Point Lonsdale, the following signals will be hoisted upon it between sunset and sunrise on and after this date, to denote the state of the tides at the Heads:—

A blue flag will be hoisted half-mast high when the tide begins to flow in the middle of the entrance between Points Lonsdale and Nepean, which will be kept flying all the first quarter of the flood tide.

The second quarter, a blue flag at the mast-head.

The third quarter, a red flag half-mast high.

The last quarter, a red flag at the mast head.

Ebb Tide.

The first quarter, a blue flag half-mast high, with a ball underneath.

The second quarter, a blue flag at the mast-head, with a ball underneath.

The third quarter, a red flag half-mast high, with a ball underneath.

The last quarter, a red flag at the mast-head, with a ball underneath.

River Yarra Yarra.

The following Tidal Signals will also be hoisted at the foremast-head of the Water Police Hulk, moored at the entrance of the River Yarra, to denote the height of the tide on the Bar:—

When there is 8 feet water on the Bar, a ball will be hoisted at the mast-head.

8½ feet—a ball half-mast high.

9 feet—two balls at the mast-head.

9½ feet—two balls half-mast high.

10 feet—a blue flag at the mast-head.

10½ feet—a blue flag half-mast high.

11 feet—a red flag at the mast-head.
